GERMANS EVADING ARMISTICE

PARIS, Jan. 7.

Only ten days remain before the appration of the time allotted to dermany for the meeting of the armistice terms of Marshal Foch, and many of the details still remain not ntirely complied with. This is particularly true as concerns article four of the armistice regarding the surrender of war materials, especially guns and airplanes. About 5,000 motor trucks have been delivered, but the number of railroad engines turned over equals only half the number stipulated in the armistice, 5,000. A great number of the 150,000 railway cars in good working order called for are still undelivered. In addition, naval units including submarines re-main in German seaports, although under the terms of the armistice they should have been surrendered. Added to the non-fulfillment of the surrender of war paraphernalia is the agreement to repatriate immediately a great number of Entente soldiers still held as prisoners, and in high quarters here the question has arisen if, in spite of Marshal Foch's ac-customed indulgence, the Inter-Alted Command will not be more severe in its dealings with Germany when the expected request by Germany for a further delay in meeting the Allied terms comes up for discussion.
