G. W. V. A. Drive.

The first day's drive of the G.W.V.A. toward their \$50,000 objective, ended with the sum of \$12,000 in the hands of the organizers. This is slightly under one-fourth of the total needed and as there is but to-day and tomorrow for the continuance of the attack, a big offensive will have to be carried on if the advance is to be successful.

The purpose therefore of the present drive is to gather sufficient funds for the establishment of a central headquarters, combining recreation and assembly rooms where the men of the city and outports may meet together for the purpose of discussing matters of a personal and general nature, all for the benefit of those who offered their all for us. What then are we going to do for them. You have only to-day and tomorrow to make up the required amount. What are you going to do toward it?
