APPROVES OF MAYFLOWER.

BOSTON, Mass., April 24. Schr. Mayflower, handicapped by the weight of rain soaked rigging and sails, by heavy seas outside, and by a deckload of passengers, made a thirty-five mile trip out of this port to-day. When she returned to her berth, veteran fishermen, who sailed aboard her as a guest, said the schr. which will meet a Canadian challenger in the fishermen's races off Halifax next fall, met with their full approval. They expressed confidence that under better conditions the Mayflower, built to keep the cup, won last year by the Gloucester fishing vessel Esperanto, from the Halifax schr. Delawana, would measure up to the standard.

#### A GERMAN PROPOSAL.
