## Magistrate's Court

A drunk was discharged.  
 Three drunks were each fined \$1 and blacklisted.  
 A motorist convicted of driving a motor car without a driver's license, and also with driving a car in a manner dangerous to the public, was fined \$20 or in default 40 days' imprisonment.  
 A case against a man charged with a breach of section 24, sub-section 3, of the Alcoholic Liquors Act, was postponed until Monday next.  
 Fifteen delinquents were summoned by the St. John's Municipal Council for non-payment of the Poll Tax. An amicable settlement was made in each case.  
 A resident of the West End was charged with being a loose and disorderly person on the public street on the night of the 22nd inst. The accused upon being asked to plead to the charge would not say whether he was guilty or not. It appears he attended the political meeting at the Casino Theatre under the influence of liquor, when he became quite excited. He remembered leaving the hall and taking charge of the torchlight procession, but when asked if he had anything to do with blowing out the red lights placed on the streets where excavation work was going on, he replied in the negative. He stated "Cashin" gave him charge of the lights but he could not remember whether they were red ones. Judge Morris in summing up said it was only a crazy man who would do anything like that, but in view of the circumstances that he was drunk and did not know what he was doing he was allowed to go with a \$20.00 fine.

## PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency Sir William Lamont Allardice, Knight Commander of the Most Distinguished Order of St. John Michael and Saint George, Governor and Commander-in-Chief in and over the Colony of Newfoundland.

Whereas it is desirable that occasion should be afforded the people of this Colony to render thanks to Almighty God for the merces He has been pleased to bestow upon this Colony during the past year, and to rejoice because of our National Blessings:

And whereas Sunday, the Fifteenth day of November next, would be an appropriate occasion for the said Thanksgiving;

I do, therefore, by this my Proclamation, order and direct that Sunday, the Fifteenth day of November, next, shall be observed, throughout this Colony, as a Day of Thanksgiving, as aforesaid.

And I do further order and direct that Wednesday, the Eleventh day of November, next, being Armistice Day, shall be set apart and observed, throughout the Colony, as a Day of Rejoicing and a Public Bank Holiday, of which all persons concerned are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.
