WONDERFUL RESULTS OF ADVERTISING.—A Minnesota editor says that a man came into his office to advertise for his lost dog, and that such was the wonderful power of advertising, the dog walked into the office while he was writing out the advertisement. A man in Cincinnati once advertised for a wife, and the next day he received letters from twenty-seven husbands, saying that he might have theirs. A broker, who advertised all kinds of stock for sale, received a letter soon after, ordering half a gross of satin elastic. A Wisconsin editor says that he advertised in his paper for a boy, and the next morning he found one, weighing ten pounds, on his door step.

GREAT IS THE PLECK OF THE OMAHA HERALD, and honorable mention it deserves and shall receive. Lately it has, through the exertions of its city editor, been exposing the outrages of rowdies and low gamblers, and the aforesaid editor has been threatened with personal violence, upon which the Herald says:—"Let neither a man by the name of Page, nor any other man, dare to touch the city editor of this paper. Lamp-posts are too numerous in this place (and there are men here who have had some experience in using them) for any such thing to be done in this community." A BURNING MOUNTAIN IN OHIO.—A very singular phenomenon is attracting attention in Ross county, Ohio. A hill of considerable altitude, known as Copperas Mountain, is located three miles from Bainbridge, from the top of which issues a constant stream of smoke, while on its summit, and general surface the vegetation has withered until the whole hill presents a barren, sterile and desolate aspect, blasted as if by a whirlwind of fire. It is believed that the interior of the hill is a mass of ignited combustible matter, and that the fire is, and has been, spreading with considerable rapidity. The theory presented to account for it, that on or about the first day of October, the party to whom the land belongs was burning brush on the hill-side, and that the flames communicated to inflammable matter, probably crude oil, coal or other combustible substances, contained in the geological formation of the hill. The quenching of the fire is, of course, impossible from its situation, and how soon, if ever, the fire will reach a point where it can be controlled, can only be conjectured. At present there is no danger to be apprehended to property in the vicinity.

ON ADVERTISING.—Do merchants bestow the notice that it merits upon the quiet and unobtrusive, yet tremendous latent power which is always at their reach and ready for their use in newspaper advertising? We refer to merchants in general, and to such intelligent and active minds as have brought out fortunes from the proper use of the local paper. Take the average merchant of country towns, who is apt to sufficiently well consider the advantages he would derive from a little judicious advertising? Does it ever occur to him that he is not quick enough in announcing his new stock, or careful enough to keep his name before the people? Does it ever seem to him that he might be first in the town instead of last, and that in neglecting advertising, he is failing to use as ready and powerful a means to success as any other he could name? An advertised article "holds its name." It is much easier to sell, and makes it easier to cause people to believe that it is as represented. For instance, a retail dry goods merchant receives a fresh invoice of French calicoes. How much easier is it for him to make a lively and striking announcement of the fact in the newspapers, than to go through the troublesome operation with each customer of explaining that the goods are just received, and that they are "imported." Advertised articles hold their name, because people "see the name in print."
