This is the great re-gion of grottoes. Above the railway sta-tion are two small grottoes, which give on a truly magnificent scale up the Lesse valley at Han near Rochefort. The chief grotto is nearly two miles long, and con-sists of a series of vast halls connected by galleries our passages. The grotto is outgread by the Saltpetre Mole (a rather stagessive title), where visitors are met by galdes carrying kinpts. In one of the halls (the Place d'Armes) is a refresh-mient bay. The Salle du Drome is about 200 yards long. 160 yards wide, and 000 yards high. Such a huge place in the bowels of the earth roduces an una-offer. The grotto is quitted by an un-effect. 

explorer, who, lost his life in the Antarctic. One of the basic ideas is that the main portion of the design should consist of white marble and bronze. A rough mass of white marble would represent the snow and ice of the Antarctic. Over this sloping mass would be seen a bronze group of Captain Scott and his two companions straggling with their sledge to their first camp. It is proposed that the lower portion of the monument should be of classic design, in the walls of which could be set high relief brosze pasels showing other striking infidents of the expedition. The smaller view shows the effect of the monument when silkouetted against the sky
