THE WEATHER PROPHECY.

Toronto, Oct. 27-11 a.m.—A depression

which was off the Middle Atlantic coast last

night has developed into an important storm,

which is now central near Halifax. The pressure

is highest in the Northwest and West-

ern states. The weather has been fine in the

Northwest Territories, cloudy in the Maritime

Provinces. Easterly and northerly gales prevail

throughout. Minimum and maximum

temperatures: Prince Albert, 22°-48°; Qu'Appelle, 25°-45°; Winnipeg, 22°-38°; Montreal, 38°-42°; Quebec, 31°-42°; Halifax, 38°-48°.
