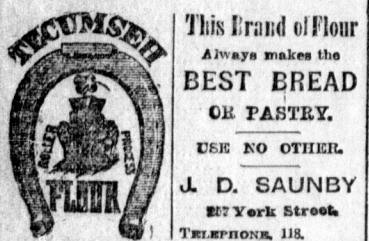

Toronto, Ont., Sept. 27—11 p.m.—A shallow and widespread depression covers the upper lake region and the Western States and the pressure is highest along the Atlantic coast. Light rains have fallen in Manitoba, elsewhere the weather has been fine.

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Misses Maggie and Bella Colwell, of West Lorne, are visiting relatives in this city.

—Mrs. Henry Cromwell, of Beachville, is visiting her son, Conductor Cromwell, Waterloo street.

—Chas. Johnston, of Lucan, was brought to this city Friday night charged with the theft of \$2 from the bar bill of the Central Hotel in that place. Squire Stanley committed him for trial and Saturday Judge Davis sent him down for three months. The bartender saw him steal it, and although Johnston made a desperate attempt to escape he was captured.

—About 11:30 o'clock Friday night three large rocks were hurled through a window at the residence of Mr. John Sherlock, 75 King street, into Mr. Sherlock's sleeping apartment. P. C. Ralph saw three men running from the spot and gave them a lively chase, capturing one of them on Rectory street. Wm. Smith was the name the prisoner gave at the Police Court Saturday morning. —Mr. Wm. Muir, of Toronto, author of "The Maple Leaf," and other national songs, and a former able editor of the Canadian Baptist, has been spending a few pleasant days in the city.

—The Forest City Quilting Club will hold a big tournament on Sept. 16 and 17. It will be open to Canada, and crack players from all parts of the country are expected. Good prizes are offered.

—George F. Beckton has laid an information against F. E. Brown, a king street boarding house keeper. Michael Tierney also complains that Mrs. Brown threw pepper in his eyes, causing him great suffering.

—Killing is the favorite pastime of the No. 3 station firemen. They have made a mammoth kite, and with about a mile of string and the assistance of the hall tower, they are trying to oust the balloon in reaching the sky.

—Chief Williams says there was only one man applied for a bus license for Fair week. He came from St. Thomas, and was not known. Methodist Missionary Society.
The 67th annual report of the Methodist Society of the Methodist Church in Canada has just been issued, giving the transactions of the society for the year ending June 30, 1891. It shows that the receipts for the year have amounted to \$243,015.43, or \$22,989 over those of the previous year. The expenditure has amounted to \$219,980.73, an increase of \$5,498 over the expenditure during the previous year. The surplus, \$23,034.65, added to the surplus of previous year, makes a grand total of \$55,564.65. The total of the surplus of \$23,034.64, being the total of legacies received during the year, has been carried to the building and investments account.
