Who Was Suffocated in the King Street Sewer-The Inquest Concluded.

According to a verdict rendered by coroner's jury the city would seem to be responsible for the death of Matthew Miller, the corporation laborer who was suffocated in the King street sewer about 1 o'clock on the morning of Saturday, April 13.

The adjourned inquest in the case was resumed at the police station last night before Coroner Flock. Henry Wallace, the other workman who was in the sewer with Miller and had a very narrow escape, has entirely recovered, and gave his account of the affair, which proved very interesting. Thos. Webb, the young man who very pluckly entered the sewer and conveyed Miller's body over a block to the Ridout street man-hole, was also examined. Engineer Graydon was the only other witness called. Mr. J. B. Mc-Killop appeared for the crown, and the widow of deceased was represented by Mr. Essery. The city was unrepre-

sented.

Henry Wallace apparently was none the worse for his dose of gas, for his re-collection of his own and Miller's actions from the time they entered the sewer until he (Wallace) became unconscious, was remarkably clear. The trip of the two men from their entrance at Ridout street until they reached Talbot, was plain sailing. About half-way between the latter street and Richmond, the dirt was caked in the sewer, and here the gas was first noticed. In Wallace's opinion it was illuminating gas that caused the trouble. After this the two went about 30 feet farther, but neither one was affected. We decided to beat a retreat, however. and had barely gone fifteen feet," said Wallace, "when I turned, and Miller said he was following. A few feet farther on I asked Miller if he was all right, but no reply came. I saw him dropping, and as he fell his feet struck mine, and I was knocked down. I reached over to catch hold of his hair, out it was too short, so I put my arm under his head to keep his face out of the water. Then I yelled that Miller was dying and began to drag him along as best I could towards the manhole. He never spoke. O'Meara put in an appearance in a little while and

assisted. Wallace had begun to feel the effects the gas at this juncture, but with O'Meara he began to drag the unconscious man towards Ridout street. Pinally Wallace became alarmed and old O'Meara to hurry up or he would

drop.
"And," continued Wallace, "O'Meara said he was going, and he went, leaving me without a lamp. Miller was at that time still alive, and I remained with him until I could not hear him breathing. Then I thought it was time for me to save myself.' Wallace started for Ridout street,

and the last thing he remembered was his head striking against the ladder Mr. McKillop—If that blind man-hole at Talbot and King was in proper con-dition you and Miller would have been able to get out? A.—Yes. Engineer Graydon told in detail the layout of the sewer and (to Mr. Essery) what might have happened if such and such had been the case. He stated that blind man-holes were placed in all

Coroner Flock-Mr. Essery, I have given you more latitude than I ever gave a lawyer in any other case, and I de not think it right that insinuations should be cast now. The room was then cleared of spectators, and the jury, afer an hour's de-liberation, found this verdict: "That Matthew Miller's death was caused by suffocation from coal gas while working in the King street sewer; that there was not the necessary precaution taken by the city for purposes f safety to life before the men went into the sewer, and that had proper precaution been taken by having open man-holes (which would have given better ventilation) Miller would not
