ST. JOHN'S CHURCH, LONDON TOWN-
SHIP.

The annual vestry meeting was held
Monday evening, Rev. Canon Richardson,
rector, in the chair. There was a good
attendance, and much interest was shown
in the affairs of the church. Mr. Alfred
Cummins was vestry clerk.

The churchwardens' financial statement,
together with that of the three parochial
societies—St. John's Guild, Women's Aux-
iliary and Junior Mission Band—and also
the cemetery report, were submitted,
showing good results, and having been
audited, were received and adopted.

The matter of a new fence for the
church and cemetery was discussed, and
steps taken toward securing it this sum-
mer.

The rectory and organ debt were re-
ported reduced since last Easter, and an
appeal will be made toward further re-
duction at once.

Messrs. R. Ambrose Powell and Thomas
McComb, jun., were re-elected church-
wardens.

Messrs. W. S. Graham, William Hod-
gins, William Cary and Charles Powell
were elected stewards.

Messrs. J. H. Marshall and John Stone-
man were appointed auditors.

At a meeting of the congregation sub-
sequently held, Mr. Thomas McComb,
sen., was elected lay representative to
synod.

The rector presented a report showing
20 Sunday services, 22 weekday services,
25 administrations of Holy Communion;
occasional Offices, 38; parochial visits, 49.

The Benediction was pronounced and
the meeting adjourned.

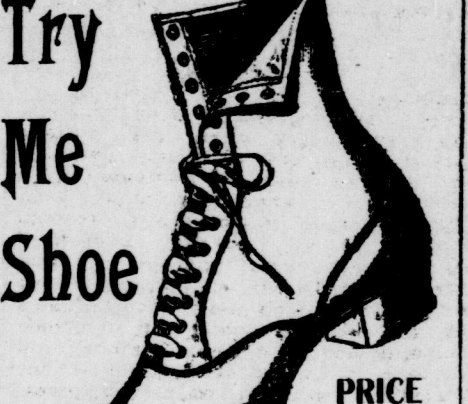

Thirty-Three Years Ago.

[From The Advertiser Files of April
10, 1863.]

Today being Good Friday, business
is generally suspended. The London

engine was tested on the banks of the
river and gave every satisfaction. The
usual number of sportsmen departed
for a day's shooting and fishing in the
country.
