is highest over the lake region and

lowest over the Maritime Provinces and

Northwest Territories. The weather to-

day has been fine in Ontario and showery

in the other provinces. Winds have been

May 28.

1899—James Storer, the great founder of the

noted Italian family, born died 1824.

1900—George I of England born, a comparatively

obscure German princeling, son of the

Electoral Prince of Saxe-Coburg, died

near there 1727; king of England 1714.

1861—Caldron de la Barca, Spanish dramatist,

died; born 1800.

1780—Thomas Moore, poet, born in Dublin; died

1832.

1807—Louis John Rudolph Agassiz, naturalist

and geologist, born in Motiers, Switzer-

land; died 1873.

1800—George Mulroon Totten, engineer, who de-

voted 25 years to Agassiz's Panama rail-

road, born in New Haven; died 1884.

1829—Sir Humphry Davy, famous English chem-

ist; born 1778.

1801—The eminent Judge Brockbridge of St.

Levi dropped dead while speaking in the

Presbyterian general assembly in Detroit.

1828—Great suffering in the southwest from

floods Arkansas City inundated, and tens

of thousands of acres of land in Arkansas,

Louisiana and Mississippi submerged, the

damage to crops and property throughout

the entire region by the floods being placed

at \$20,000,000.

1880—Charles II of England born died 1685.

1880—James Francis, duke of

Marborough, born died 1744.

1703—Patrick Henry, patriot orator of the

Revolution, born at Studley, Hanover county,

Va.; died 1799.

1793—Joseph Fouché, finance minister of Na-

poleon I, born at Nantes died 1820.

1810—The Count de Montalembert, French

statesman, born in London; died in Paris

1870.

1814—Empress (or ex-Empress) Josephine died

at Malmaison, near Paris; born in Marti-

nique 1763.

1848—Sir Thomas Dick Lauder, miscellaneous

writer, died at Edinburgh.

1825—John Davidson, died at West

Point, born in Virginia 1798.

1877—John Lothrop Motley, historian and

former American minister to England, died at
