"Canada values highly the measure of local independence which has been granted it from time to time by the Imperial authorities, and which has been so productive of beneficial results, both as respects the material progress of the country and the strengthening of the ties that bind it to the motherland. That the taxpayrs of the United Kingdom st desire to be relieved of some of the burdens which they bear in connection with military expenditure is quite reasonable. 
