THEATERS AND DANCING REFERRED
TO IN SUNDAY MORNING SERMON

Rev. Father McKeon Talks Plain-ly
ly to His Congregation.

Two New Chapters of Brotherhood of
St. Andrew Organized—Needs of
Superannuation Fund.

"If you commit a venial sin, know-
ing full well that it is but the first
step to a more serious action, then
you are guilty of a mortal sin, and are
taking your hope of salvation in your
own hands and are making yourself a
stranger to Almighty God."

"This is what Rev. Father McKeon
told his congregation in St. Mary's Church
Sunday morning.

"Let us take the theaters, for ex-
ample," continued the priest. "Some
of our congregation sit at the theaters,
but others are not fit for any man
or woman to see. I have been
told by citizens whose word I hold in
the greatest respect that they have
gone to the opera house and heard and
seen things there which caused them
to blush and embarrased their wives
and daughters. But people cannot
excuse themselves by saying they did
not know what class of play they
were going to see. It is no sin to go
to the theater, but to go and see and
hear immoral things is a mortal sin.
Men and women should not patronize
anyone who has a tendency to
lower the morals of the community
in the slightest degree. Do not be sat-
isfied with the sight of a grave neglect
of duty when they allow their daugh-
ters to keep company with young men,
and to leave them to their own
devices. Your first round duty
may be your first step downward, and
it is thus the blackest mortal sin you
can commit. Cease this immoral pub-
lic discourse, and devote some of your thoughts to the
serious side of life.

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SNOW FALLS IN
MONTH OF APRIL

In Forty-Seven Years Only Two
Have Occurred at Later
Dates than Friday's.

Though there have been snowfalls of
various depths in April, almost every
year the records at the Toronto obser-
vatory show that only twice since Con-
federation has snow fallen in Ontario upon
a later date in the spring than the snow-
fall of Friday. Eleven years ago there
was a mantle of white on the earth on
the same date half as thick again as it
was on Friday night. It is remarkable
how quickly one forgets past weather.
The people who are complaining that
they never saw such a thing so late in
the spring overlook the fact that on April
20, 1861, only three years ago, there was
a big snowfall which did not depart
until it had deposited 13.3 inches of the
beautiful over the city and adjacent
