

WIPE OUT BY LANDSLIDE

Destruction of Village in North Caucasus.

Large Number of Collisions Between War Vessels in British Navy.

Vladikavkaz, North Caucasus, Russia, June 7.—The village of Cambulata, in a mountain pass of the Uruch Range, has been destroyed by a landslide. A large rent suddenly appeared in the mountain, which, shortly afterwards, toppled over on the village and the neighboring farms. The inhabitants escaped.

THE ALLEGED NEW COMBINE.

London, June 7.—The London Daily Chronicle says it is now practically certain that the British and Canadian Governments will give a joint subsidy to the new fast steamers which are to be built by the new British shipping combine.

110 WAR VESSEL COLLISIONS IN TWO YEARS.

The frequency of British torpedo-boat collisions and torpedo-boat collisions and the general one was emphasized Saturday in a reply of the secretary of the admiralty, Mr. Arnold-Forster, to a question in the House of Commons, showing that there were no less than 110 such occurrences in 1900 and 1901.

GETS A \$50,000 FEE.

London, June 7.—A South African syndicate, consisting of former associates of the late Cecil Rhodes, have taken some property in Alaska on the Klondike boundary, where they intend to invest £1,000,000. William Fitzhugh, of San Francisco, will go out to inspect the properties. He will receive a fee of £10,000 for the work. This is probably the largest fee of this kind ever paid to an expert.

METHODISTS DISCUSS THE PASTORAL TERM

Proposal at Toronto Conference to Abolish Itinerary System.

Toronto, June 9.—At the Toronto Methodist Conference Saturday morning a resolution was introduced and strongly supported by the Victoria conference favoring the abolition by the general conference of the pastoral term. Dr. Dewar and others of the older members strongly defended the itinerary system. The resolution was sent on to the general conference with the words "for favorable consideration" struck out.

A motion to increase the percentage paid by ministers for the superannuation fund from 2 to 5 per cent was voted down by 51 to 46, and goes to the conference with an adverse opinion attached to it.

The Death Record.

London, June 5.—Sir Daniel Cooper, formerly acting agent-general for New South Wales in England, is dead.

Sir Daniel Cooper was born in Lancashire in 1821. He was for some years a merchant in Sydney, N. S. W., and was elected to the Provincial Legislature in 1848. He was elected speaker under the new constitution in 1856. He was created a baronet in 1862.

The President of the Bank of Ottawa Interviewed in London.

London, June 9.—Mr. George Burn, president of the Bank of Ottawa, now in London, has been saying a good word for Canada. In an interview in the Daily Mail he says: "Where is Canada obtaining the money that is causing her great prosperity? From her soil, sir. It springs, it bubbles from the soil in the shape of abundant harvests of wheat, corn, barley—all sound grains and fruits, in fact. It comes out as well in rich minerals, and as yet our natural resources have scarcely been tapped. We are the country of the future and are well aware of the fact."

"Mind you, we are working on rather quiet lines—we do not believe in manipulating or manufacturing 'booms' such as our neighbors to the south delight in. We have 'wild cats' in Canada, but they are in the swamps, and when they come out we shoot them. Our harvests and our mines do all the advertising we require, and Canada is being built up on a sure financial foundation."

"Yes, money is certainly coming into the country from England and from the United States, but whether the Americans or the English capitalists are supplying the larger proportion of this assistance is a big question. Personally I do not care to express an opinion on the point. However, Canada's prosperity in the future is assured."

BRIGHT BOY KILLED.

New York, June 7.—Fifteen-year-old John Dan, who stood at the head of the graduating class of public school, No. 6, Hoboken, died at his home in that city on Tuesday. He was to have been valedictorian at the commencement exercises of the class. Excessive study aggravated an affection of the heart, and when the examination at the school was over a week ago he was obliged to take to his bed.

He kept crying for his diploma and at the meeting of the commission of public instruction Monday night a document was made out and given to his teacher to present to him. He died a few moments before the teacher reached his home. The diploma will be buried with him.

NO PRESIDENTIAL INTERVENTION.

New York, June 7.—The board of trade and transportation has received a telegram from President Roosevelt apprising them that he would be glad to receive the committee appointed by the board to ask the president to appoint a commission to take steps looking towards the settling of the anthracite coal miners' strike. The telegram, however, pointed out that the law empowering the president to act in instances similar to this strike was repealed in 1898. Still the president said he would be glad to see the committee if it decided to visit him. After considering the fact that the law had been repealed the committee decided not to visit the president.

POLICE DOGS' GOOD SERVICES

Some Canine Sleuths That Trail, But Do Not Bite.

How Animals Are Carefully Trained in the City of Ghent to Hunt Down Thieves.

The recent discontinuance of the Marquette prison authorities of the use of bloodhounds in trailing escaped prisoners was due, no doubt, to the sentiment against methods that are regarded as relics of slavery days. Those persons, however, who have given the subject careful study and investigation, contend that there is nothing inhuman or brutal in hunting down fugitives with properly trained police dogs which, when educated to their work and securely muzzled so that they can do no harm to their game when captured, have proved invaluable for the purpose. In this connection the system of training man-hunting animals in Ghent, Belgium, will make interesting reading.

Bloodhounds have long been used to trace fugitives, and individual policemen in different cities have used dogs to "smell out" drunks on their beats. Chief Constable Wesemael, of Ghent, Belgium, is probably the first authority to systematically train dogs for police work.

TRAINING POLICE DOGS.

Ghent is a city of some 200,000 inhabitants, a great manufacturing center and, as always in such cases, it at times overrun with undesirable elements. The more prosperous citizens of that beautiful town live in suburbs in villas surrounded by gardens, and the protection of these suburbs from thieves had always been a problem. Wesemael's great trouble, Try as he and his men would they could not prevent burglaries. Finally he became possessed of the idea to train dogs for this service, and since the introduction of the "police dog" burglaries have fallen off fully two-thirds.

ARE TIRELESS WORKERS.

The dogs are extremely well kept and fed, and on duty always wear a wire muzzle and stout leather collar studded with sharp nails, which makes it impossible to grab the animal by the throat to choke him. Proudly they go in the evening he goes to work, and long before the time there is a joyful barking among the canines, in anticipation of the work before them. The dogs are attached to certain officers with whom they make the rounds. As soon as the suburban districts are reached the officer frees him from the restraining chain, and he begins a systematic search of the gardens surrounding the residences. Every hedge, bit of shrubbery, dark corner—in fact, any place where a human being might be able to hide—is carefully searched by the faithful animal, and woe to the stranger found in such cases where an innocent person was "held up" by one of these police dogs are indeed very rare. At 6 in the morning the dogs are out, and their work is finished.

The results from the use of these dogs were so gratifying after the first few months that the authorities of Ghent decided on a larger appropriation for the training of more animals. The entire expense of keeping the dogs amounts to no more than 1,500 francs—about \$300 a year, while the value of their service can hardly be estimated in money. The fact is, however, that burglaries have decreased over 60 per cent since their introduction.

A. J. C. Smith, who has a kennel of English bloodhounds at Ann Arbor, Mich., with the assistance of Mr. C. Peterson, been training them for criminal work, with good results. At a recent test these dogs trailed their man, who had taken a circuitous and misleading route, covering a distance of five and a half miles, and located him in 22 minutes. The experiments conducted in Ann Arbor have shown that the dogs would be invaluable in tracking fugitives from justice.

AGE OF THE EARTH

Ancients Varied as Widely in Their Estimate as Do Scientists.

Scientists cannot even now agree within many millions of years to the age of the world. No wonder the ancients differed widely. Josephus, among all ancient authorities, fixes the shortest period, namely, 4,718, counting up to the present time.

The Jews came next, making the world 5,561 years old.

They are followed by Scaliger, according to whom the age of the world is now 5,520 years.

The age fixed by Christian teachers is the fourth in point of length, 5,994 years.

According to the calculation of the authority Eusebius, the world's age is now 7,001 years.

The Greeks make it out of various lengths. The Alexandrian or Ecclesiastical age is 7,556 years; the Ptolemaic era is 7,830 years; and the civil era, 8,000 years.

The Russians fix the age at the same figure as the Greek civil era, 8,000 years.

According to the Alphonsine tables, the world is 8,826 years old.

Eastern nations agree in placing the figures of modern geologists, though still a long way off.

The Egyptians make the age of the world 31,500 years.

The Chaldeans place it at 455,221 years; and the Brahmins of India make it to exceed 780,000 years.

Our modern scientists go far beyond these figures. Prof. Solles says that the world is 55,000,000 years old, others multiplying this figure by tens and hundreds.

He must insinuate himself up and down the aisle of his car without the use of force, or the laps of irascible bankers, or treading on the corns of such as wear them. And while others clutch at straps or dashboards or door-knobs or the cord he rings his fares with, when the motorman is seized with a sudden frenzy for action he must be the idea to open the door or lose his dignity. He can be philosophic after he grows used to it, and find advantages in his wild career, as a conductor remarks, "The worst of going by electricity is it most shakes your liver out.
