Mr. Lancaster's Measure Brings First Division of the House—Label Registration.

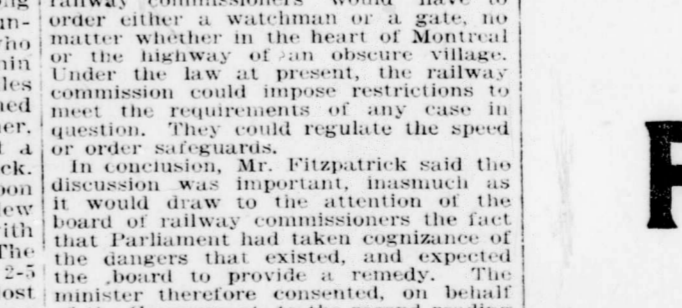

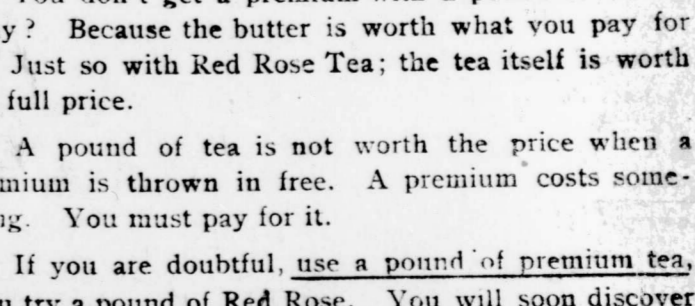
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
