Lewis Wigle Leamington, representative of the Empire Tobacco Company, D. Wigle a grower of tobacco, Kingsville, and J. O'Brien, Chatham, a cigar manufacturer, were all examined and gav evidence in regard to the good qual-Ontario, particularly in the centers of Kent and Essex. Lewis Wigle advocated the prohibition of the importation of American tobacco except for the making of fine cigars. He said that Canada could grow the best kind of smoking and chewing tobacco and leaf for the medium cigar. Mr O'Brien who used foreign leaf in his factory admitted this. All of them favored the uniform stamp. Mr Baldwin, Colchester, a tobaccogrower, suggested the Government sending experts to teach farmers how to grow tobacco. He spoke of the prejudice
