Best Thing in the World.

Dr. H. A. Stevenson states that distance running and all out-door sport is the best thing in the world providing that the work and training is kept up. The grind does not damage a man's system for the men who accompany the dog trains in the Arctic regions often cover 50 or 60 miles a day. There is a danger however, he says, "should a man overdevelop his lungs, and then drop training, degeneration results, and in a short time another is added to the long list of white plague victime.
