CONTRACT OF NIAGARA POWER OUT OF COUNCIL'S HANDS

Water Commission Will Deal With All Contracts, Etc., Until the New Utilities Board Is Installed in Office—Matter Settled Last Night.

The utilities commission bylaw was given its third reading last night at the council meeting, and today the water commissioners are in control of the power matter, and will remain in control until the utilities commission proper take charge in January.

When the bylaw came up, Ald. Beattie moved that it be given its third reading and finally passed, Ald. Stevenson seconded it.

"What are you going to do?" asked Ald. Ferguson. "How can you do that in face of the motion to send the report on the tenders back to the committee until an independent engineer can report on the figures? It is out of the question."

The bylaw was given a third reading, the division being as follows: Ferguson, Ald. Beattie, Stevenson, Ferguson, Garratt, Stewart, Moorhead, Fitzgerald, Gerry and Mayor Stevely, Nays—Ald. Ferguson, Rose and Cooper.

Ald. Cooper Irritated. "There were only six votes in favor of it before the yeas and nays were called for," shouted Ald. Cooper. "Where is your backbone?"

The commission will take charge today, and all tenders, contracts, etc., must be dealt with by that body. This vote practically nullifies the former motion and leaves the matter of a consulting engineer in the hands of the water board.

Uxbridge Tragedy Bodies Exhumed

Wyoming, Dec. 6.—Dr. A. J. Harrington, of Toronto, accompanied by Detective Greer, today exhumed the bodies of Mrs. A. R. McLachlan and her two little boys for the purpose of

obtaining such portions of the bodies as might be necessary to furnish evidence at the trial of A. R. McLachlan, who is now in Uxbridge jail charged with the murder of his wife and little ones.

Would Enter Canadian Pulp Free

Washington, Dec. 6.—A partial revision of the tariff is proposed in a bill and two resolutions presented at the opening of the sixty-first congress today by Representative Mann, of Ill.

The bill provides that Canadian woodpulp and print paper shall be admitted free of duty, one of the dates on which maximum and minimum resolutions provides for postponing the

tariff of the Aldrich-Payne law shall take effect from April 1, 1910, to Jan. 1, 1911, while the other provides that when the maximum tariff shall not be held to apply to woodpulp and print paper imported from Canada, Mr. Mann announced his purpose to introduce these measures some days ago. He will make every effort to have them reported to the House.

Gives Million Dollars for Cancer Hunt

New York, Dec. 6.—George Crocker gave to Columbia University an endowment for carrying on this work. Later, however, he selected Columbia, and today it was reported that the institution would be the beneficiary of a large amount.

A prominent member of the Physicians and Surgeons' College acknowledged that Mr. Crocker had considered the founding of a research institution in connection with Columbia, but this man could not say definitely that the plan had been made by the Crocker will.

WITHOUT FOOD OR DRINK FIVE DAYS

Pitiful Plight of Stowaway Discovers on Boat at Sarnia—Not Likely to Recover.

Port Huron, Mich., Dec. 6.—After having been exposed to the weather for five days, without food or drink, Henry Brown, who has been in America but three weeks, coming from Scotland, was found on the steamer Point Edward this morning.

Brown, who was in an agonizing condition when found, was at once taken to the General Hospital at Sarnia and medical treatment was given him, but the attending physicians state that his chances of recovery are few. Brown regained consciousness enough today to inform the Sarnia officials of how he came to be on the boat and told them his name. In the latter part of the afternoon the Sarnia authorities it was learned that he had been in America but three weeks, and that he had no money, so had decided to beat his way to Sarnia on the boat.

"I have some relatives in the vicinity of London, and I was endeavoring to reach them," said the almost paralyzed man.

BOY WAS FOUND GUILTY

The young boy, whose parents reside in Chelsea Green, who was accused before Squire Clitlock on Saturday of terrorizing another little boy two years his junior, so that the latter was afraid to go to school, was found guilty, and after being reprimanded by the magistrate, was allowed to go on suspended sentence on his father paying the costs of the action.

The evidence of the boy's father and mother went to prove that the action of the elder boy had made the younger one's life burdensome, as he was subject to constant petty annoyances, and even once when his mother had sent the boy to school with a cutter, who was drawing gravel in the neighborhood, the older boy had thrown stones and even tried to strangle him off the wagon, until restrained by the driver.

OPPOSITION CONVENTION

Committee Will Recommend That It Be Held in Winnipeg.

Ottawa, Dec. 6.—The Conservative sub-committee appointed to make a recommendation as to the place of holding the big party convention next year, will report to the party caucus tomorrow in favor of Winnipeg in July next. If the convention was to be held in what would be favored, but the idea is to have it in Winnipeg during the week in July next.
