

## LAWRENCE REPLIES TO ALFRED MOND

Leading British Tariff Reformer's  
Stirring Speech at  
Toronto.

## DENIES MOND'S TRADE STATEMENTS

Says He Misrepresented Conditions in  
England, and Used Sir Wilfrid  
Laurier's Speeches for  
Exploitation.

Toronto, Oct. 12.—In a ringing speech before the Empire Club today, at McConkey's, Sir Joseph Lawrence, ex-M.P. of England, and a leading tariff reformer, replied to the free trade speeches Sir Alfred Mond delivered in Toronto and Ottawa.

So stirred was Sir Joseph by the Canadian speeches of his free trade antagonist, that he broke in on his holiday and consented to come to this city to address the Empire Club. Throughout it was a fighting speech, full of challenges and indignant denials.

Rebelling against that Sir Alfred had "revealed in an orgy of misrepresentation and misapprehension," Sir Joseph, point by point, took up and answered the alleged misstatements of his antagonist.

Applause greeted his mention of his old chief, Sir Joseph Chamberlain, and his charge that the spirit of Cobdenism was antagonistic to the colonial system—as antagonistic today as in the days of yore.

"Sir Alfred Mond's speeches," said the speaker, "are a colossal and grotesque misapplication of statistics to bolster up his free trade cause. I strongly suspect that they are part of an organized crusade of political disinformation among the Canadian people."

**Exploit Laurier's Speech.**  
"Sir Alfred has been revealing in an 'orgy of misrepresentation and abuse of the aims and methods of tariff reform party with a view to its reflex action on the impending general election in Great Britain. I would like to say in passing that even the speeches of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the west have been exploited by the free trade press and party. They had been saying that he was a follower of Cobden, Bright, Gladstone, but that Canada herself, under his leadership, was turning in the direction of free trade, of which reciprocity is the first step."

"I have charged that this free trade crusade is disingenuous, and I can prove it. Sir Alfred, while apparently guarding himself against interference with the fiscal policy of Canada, has not hesitated to commend to you the example of Gladstone and Peel in remitting taxes. He does this at a time when you ought to be negotiating with us about to enter upon with the United States."

"His obvious purpose is that his speeches and actions in Canada may be telegraphed back to England, showing how much you are in sympathy with free trade, and so enable the free trade party to thwart the efforts of closer commercial relations with the empire."

At this point Sir Joseph analyzed briefly Sir Alfred Mond's facts and figures, vigorously challenging him upon every point.

**England No El Dorado.**  
"He painted England to you as an El Dorado," Sir Joseph continued, "and boasted that the Cobdenite school had been vindicated whereas the facts prove the reverse. Every prediction of Cobden has been falsified by events, and today we are presented with the example of a country in which millions are unemployed and underfed, and in which both capital and people are fleeing to other countries (protectionists), where both capital and labor receive a better reward."

"And Sir Alfred claims that the free trade party is in sympathy with the colonies. I am sure you are sure of the Cobdenite school has been vindicated whereas the facts prove the reverse. Every prediction of Cobden has been falsified by events, and today we are presented with the example of a country in which millions are unemployed and underfed, and in which both capital and people are fleeing to other countries (protectionists), where both capital and labor receive a better reward."

"Writing to Col. Cole, Cobden said he was interested in the confederation scheme because he thought it was a step in the direction of amicable separation, thus confirming the view he expressed in 1842."

"The colonial system with all its appeal to the people can never be got rid of except by the indirect process of free trade, which will gradually and imperceptibly loose the bands which united our colonies to us by a mistaken notion of self-interest."

"The free trade Cobdenites," continued the speaker, "may deem it necessary to resist to the bitter end, but for the moment, because of the tariff reform party, they are sure of the colonies."

## KAISER'S HAND IS BEHIND NEW PLOT

Near East Will Probably Be the  
Scene of Trouble  
Shortly.

Vienna, Oct. 12.—That the near east is to be one of the warmest corners of international pressure in Europe in the future, is seen in the movements now going on among the nations to get together on one side or other of the combinations.

Kaiser Wilhelm's open glorification of the Austro-German alliance has given a new spur to the negotiations that have progressed more or less unofficially for the past year or two, to bring about a great Balkan confederation, for the preservation of the smaller states. All the small Danubian countries are desperately anxious to get to cover, seeing that Russia is wiggling her tail in the Balkans.

This being the case, all the denials in the world do not dispose of the reported military agreement between Turkey and Roumania. The hand of the Kaiser is behind it, because Bulgaria, Montenegro, Serbia and Greece seem tending toward an understanding, and so German influence in Constantinople has been used to make Roumania the link uniting Austria to Turkey, so as to checkmate Bulgarian ambitions.

**Austria Awake.**  
Meanwhile Austria is building Dreadnoughts and extending military and naval works on the Adriatic coast. At Pola a great floating dock is under construction for the Dreadnought that is on the stocks at Trieste, while new fortifications are being built on the Dalmatian Islands. All this means money, and when the heavily increased Austrian army and navy estimates are debated in the reichsrath in the next few days, there will be a storm of criticism of the extended expenditure. For, in addition to these works, the minister of war has a scheme in hand for rearmament, the provision of a new fleet, the production of a two years army service system.

Turkey, on her part, is mainly concerned with watching Bulgaria on land, while for sea service she is not only buying old warships in Germany and ordering new ones in England, but she is establishing first-class naval bases at Salonika and Smyrna. Experts are now drawing up plans for making these ports and harbors, and the navy, with special naval docks and arsenals. It would appear that German contractors will secure the work—another proof of German ascendancy in the Sultan's capital.

**DEATH DOES NOT STOP LITIGATION**  
Originals All Dead, But Case Goes on in Toronto Courts.

Toronto, Oct. 12.—Death, the most powerful, most yield to litigation. Before Mr. Justice Latchford in single court today, a case was called in which the original plaintiff had died; the original defendant had died, and the original reference had died.

Years ago a man named Brain conducted a brewery at Hornby, under the firm name of Brain Brothers, and one of his customers was a man named Coffin, a Georgetown hotelkeeper. Brain died in 1904, leaving his estate to the widow during her life, to revert to the children at her death.

Mrs. Brain continued the business and, in course of time sold Coffin on an account owing her the sum of \$1,000. Mrs. Brain died, and for goods supplied since his death, Coffin declared that he had settled with Brain. The action was tried before Chief Justice Mulock in 1906, and the judgment was in favor of Mrs. Brain. The matter to Neil McLean for an account, Mr. McLean found against the plaintiff, and in favor of Coffin.

Mrs. Brain appealed from Referee McLean's report to O. R. Justice Clute in 1908, and Mr. Justice Clute set the report back to Referee McLean. Then Mrs. Brain died, followed by the death of Coffin. The action against the Coffin estate was assumed by Mrs. Brain's daughter, Anna Beatrice Brain, who was defended by W. A. F. Campbell solicitor, of Georgetown, executor under Coffin's will.

Mr. McLean died before he could reach the reference, and the matter went before his successor, J. A. C. Cameron. Mr. Cameron heard the case and also found for the defendant. At Osgoode Hall today the plaintiff appeared from Referee Cameron's report.

**KING ON PILGRIMAGE**  
Aged Austrian Monarch Goes to Famous Shrine of Maria Zell.

London, Oct. 12.—Notwithstanding the severe cold which already prevails in the Styrian Alps, that wonderful old monarch, Emperor Francis Joseph, despite his 89 years, has just made a pilgrimage to the famous shrine of Maria Zell, some sixty miles from Vienna.

It was 53 years since he had visited the shrine, and the occasion of this pilgrimage was the occasion he travelled on a new railway line which passes through the romantic scenery of Green Styria.

The emperor's old church was a treasure chamber which is a museum of antiques, jewels, relics and gifts worth approximately \$7,500,000, among the donors of which are emperors, kings and members of aristocratic families in all parts of Europe who have made pilgrimages to the place to pray before the picture of the Madonna, to which are attributed miraculous powers.

After performing his devotions before the holy image, the emperor heard mass and then inspected the treasures of the church, especially the collection of ecclesiastical robes, most of which are richly adorned with diamonds, rubies and emeralds. He was deeply moved at seeing a dalmatian presented many years ago by his consort, the Empress Elizabeth, who fell by an assassin's hand twelve years ago this month.

## GREEKS ARE EAGER FOR TURKISH FIGHT

Would Welcome Chance to Wipe  
Out Old Scores With  
Enemy.

Athens, Oct. 12.—Even though the din of the elections has died away and advice has poured in from many quarters, home and foreign, to devote more energy and care to internal development and less to foreign happenings, the situation in Greece continues unsatisfactory. The political parties show signs of sharp cleavage, at least partly of the army is disloyal, and the public mind is aflame with anti-Turkish bitterness.

Even the king's appeal for internal quiet in a trying situation has failed to stop the intrigues and wirepulling contending political factions, so there is a constant succession of alarms and precautionary measures. To purge the army, the Government turned out scores of incompetents within the past year, yet such is the lack of men worthy to lead that their places cannot be filled.

Every action of Turkey is being magnified into an affront to Greek dignity, no matter whether it affects Greece or Macedonia and denunciatory letters continue to appear in the press though Greeks living in Turkey have warned the Athenian editors that such publications are laid up against Greeks in Macedonia and elsewhere by the Turkish authorities. Greece, in short, is floundering about in a fog of racial frenzy without steady guidance and calm perspective.

The worst factor in the situation is undoubtedly the feeling among Greek agitators that they may goad Turkey as much as they please, for the great powers will keep the Mussulman's scimitar from reaching the land of the accusers. But for the fact that the military league is unpopular, and therefore unable to get the ear of the people, the situation would be well nigh intolerable.

Turkey aggravates the strain frequently by wounding Greek pride, but the lack of sagacity is by no means only in Constantinople. The outlook for the winter is bad in Thessaly, not only because of the political unrest, but because the crops have suffered from locust devastation and heavy rains.

**FOREIGNERS ARE GOING HOME FOR CHRISTMAS**  
The East-Bound Trains Passing Through London Are Heavily Loaded.

Every day trainloads of foreigners pass through London on the east-bound trains for New York. The majority are Scandinavians, Poles and Germans, who are returning home to spend Christmas in their own lands. The Scandinavian winter is much milder and more pleasant than our Canadian one, and the spirit of the north is more active during the Yuletide season, and the months which directly follow.

It is the autumn of the year that thrills the Teutonic and Slavic blood with thoughts of home and "afterland." Very few Americans have any idea how many foreigners recross the Atlantic at this time of year. They come from Winnipeg, Chicago, Minneapolis, Kansas City, and other western points. The majority of them will return to America next spring, together with increased numbers of their compatriots.

**INSTANTLY KILLED**  
Robert Dobson, of Brampton, Thrown Out in Runaway Accident.

Brampton, Oct. 12.—Robert Dobson, retired marble dealer, was thrown from his buggy at Streetsville this evening and instantly killed. The horse bolted and threw the unfortunate man out. He lived only a few moments after being picked up.

Amherst, N. S., Oct. 13.—A. S. F. L. more's carriage factory at Southamptown was completely destroyed by fire. The loss will be \$5,000, on which there is \$6,000 insurance.

## RECIPROCITY WILL BE TAKEN UP SHORTLY

Hon. Charles Murphy at Chicago Says Negotiations Will Be Resumed Soon.

Chicago, Oct. 12.—Hon. Charles Murphy, Canadian secretary of state, said in an interview here this afternoon, that he expected reciprocity negotiations between the United States and Canada would be resumed before Nov. 1.

Mr. Murphy was guarded in his utterances, but expressed the hope that some agreement of benefit to both countries would be arrived at. Mr. Murphy and Vice-President Sherman were the principal speakers at the Knights of Columbus Discovery Day banquet tonight.

Political and economic subjects were avoided by Mr. Murphy and the vice-president, both of whom confined their remarks to the deeds of Columbus and to the good relations existing between Canada and the United States.

## DISPUTE CONVICT'S CLAIM AS AUTHOR

Prisoner Says That the Famous Hymn Was Written By Him in England.

Toronto, Oct. 12.—Wm. Huckle's claim to the authorship of "Just for Today," hymn No. 676, in the Anglican Common Book of Praise, in the opinion of Mr. J. Edmund Jones, secretary of the hymn committee has little foundation.

Huckle is now serving a seven-year term in Kingston Penitentiary on a charge of attempting under the guise of a doctor to extort money from various people in return for silence regarding information in his possession.

**Met Nun Who Wrote It.**  
"I met this woman in England to whom this hymn is ascribed in Julian's dictionary," states Mr. Jones. "I have seen her volume of verses containing this hymn. The verses were written in 1840 by her and always remains anonymous, she would not want her name associated with a Protestant hymnal. The hymn appears in the hymn book of 1840, and it is more likely that this lady, who is a sister of Notre Dame in England, and comes of a very prominent family, is the author, as I do not think her capable of stealing it."

Mr. Jones says other claims have been made to this hymn. The three verses of the original which were not published in the hymnal are:

"Let me in purgatorial fires Brief space delay,  
O, let me, if today I die, Go home today."

"And if today my tide of life Shall ebb away,  
Let me thy sacraments receive, Sweet Lord, today."

"Let me with Thee, my own true life, In spirit stay;  
Stay Thou with me, my only strength, Just for today."

Huckle sent a letter to the Archbishop of Ottawa claiming credit for the authorship of the hymn. He says his reason for writing was that credit be given where it is due, and that "you will feel that if my verses are considered worthy of a place in the hymn book, they should be acknowledged."

How he came to write the hymn, said Huckle, was through an infidel calling out while he (Huckle) was preaching at an open-air meeting: "Why do you pray for daily bread; why not ask for a week's supply." In reply, says Huckle, "I told him the story of the small boy fishing bank notes of a day."

**BOY ROBBERS CAUGHT.**  
Rochester, N. Y., Oct. 12.—For some time money has been missing from the cash exchange of a large department store. A watch was set and today the police solved the mystery, when they caught four small boys fishing bank notes of the piles by means of a stick pushed through the steel screens on the end of which was a piece of gum. The bills readily stuck to the gum and had of from ten to twenty dollars were made at a time. The boys were arrested.

## PREFERRED DEATH.

Hardwick, Vt., Oct. 12.—Edward Aiken, prominent and wealthy resident of this town, committed suicide by hanging today in a cell in the local jail. He was arrested yesterday as a result of charges preferred by a 12-year-old girl, and the local authorities declare that he had confessed to improper conduct with seven other young girls. Aiken was 55 years of age.
