C. E. CONVENTION

TRADE GENERALLY FIRM

Unusual heat have given a decidedly sunny tone to general business there. There continues, however, an excellent movement of general goods and all branches of labor seem to be well employed. Crops in this district have shown great need for rain. Reports from the west continue exceedingly optimistic, and the business are considered most encouraging. Money is in active demand and firm. Collections are generally fair to good. Business in country districts has been active. The hot dry weather has dried up much of the on-coming fruit in fall and there is a full-grown possibility that the proceedings may drag along into the early part of next week. At the Coast.

SMOKE EVIL ABATED ON ENGLAND'S ROADS

Skilled Stoking and Mechanical Device Have Solved Problem.

Chicago, July 8. — That the smoke in Chicago is caused by the use of inferior methods for firing locomotives and the use of improved gas-devices is the opinion of Samuel M. Peck, president of the Chicago Great Western Railroad company, who has returned from Europe where he made a study of railroad operation.

A leading railway authority in London is of the opinion that the elimination of smoke from locomotives is a matter of public health and that the smoke which is suggested that railway locomotives might promote their own welfare and that of the public as well as saving representatives to England for the purpose of studying methods used there.

"You never hear complaints in London about the smoke nuisance," said Mr. Peck. "I rode through a tunnel a mile long near that city with my window open and did not notice a bit of smoke. Their coal is no better than our best grades, but they use a different method of firing. The smoke is not so thick as ours, and it is not so offensive. I believe we could reduce the amount of smoke from locomotives if we went about it in the right way. In saying this I do not wish to reflect unfavorably on the good work that has been done along this line by railroad managers in Chicago."

The electrification of large railroad terminals is still in its infancy and will require much more study and experiment, has been given to it here.

"One would have thought that the devices used on English railroads and in reducing the smoke."

English roads are able to furnish better service to the travelling public, Mr. Peck said, because they charge higher fares.

"There service is better than ours," he added. "Their big express trains, for instance, they operate a schedule between two dining cars and in this way the odors noticeable on our trains do not reach the passengers. Patrons of the English dining cars are obliged to stand in line and wait not a seat, as is frequently the case in this country."

HIDDEN MYSTERY IN STOKES CASE

Nine Letters Missing That May Mean a Scandal.

A CHILD IS MENTIONED

Stokes Says He Wanted Correspondence to Prevent Annoyance to Bride.

New York, July 7. — Proceedings in the case of Millard W. Stokes against Lillian Graham and Ethel Conrad, whom he charges with attempted blackmail and with shooting holes in his legs in the Varuna apartments one evening last month, reached a critical stage today. Tomorrow is likely to bring the preliminary proceedings, which are of a preliminary nature to a close and to determine whether or not the young woman will be sent to trial for alleged assault with intent to kill. Stokes is believed by many that Magistrate Freschi would commit them for trial, but the girls were confident of liberty.

It is said neither Miss Graham nor Stokes could be held in custody. Their evidence being reserved for court trial use. If such a trial is ordered, the matter will be a farce, Stokes staking it as soon as they are set free, making Stokes the hero and using the material developed in the hearing.

"I have four other letters that Stokes wrote me," said Miss Graham, "and when they are read, in court they will take all of the story out of his story. They will show why he was so anxious to get these letters away from me before their contents became public."

"Ethel and I are going into vaudeville after we are discharged here. I am writing a sketch. Part of it will concern the case of Stokes. I will make it a sketch of a man in a boat, and make it something of a farce. It ought to be a scream."

Stokes is theatrical, and is not reticent. During cross-examination he took a "stir" on the end of every answer he made to the first few questions, and shouting his statement in a loud voice.

FRANCE AND MOROCCO

Cabinet Decides to Take Up Matter in Conciliatory Spirit.

However, France will not listen to proposals to discuss the relations of the different powers in Morocco as defined by any treaty or agreement now existing. In this decision the French government has the entire support of Great Britain.

Foreigner Wanted in Manitoba Caught at the Falls.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., July 8. — Antonio Vesco, an Italian, who is wanted by the police of Niagara Falls, was caught at the falls today. Vesco was charged with murdering Paolo Di Paolo by shooting him at Point Dubois Oct. 20 last week before Vesco was deported. Phenomenal Growth of the Revenue

Ottawa, July 7. — A feature of the Dominion financial estimate for the first quarter of the current fiscal year, just issued, is the continued growth of revenue which it shows. For the three months ended June 30, the customs revenue was \$2,500,000 in excess of the receipts for the first quarter of 1910-11. This rate, if continued, would mean an increase of \$10,000,000 for the fiscal year, which would bring the customs receipts up to the phenomenal figure of \$80,000,000 for the twelve months.

The total revenue for the three months ended June 30 amounted to \$29,239,646, an increase of \$2,904,793 over the first quarter of last year. Expenditure on consolidated fund account was \$8,953,732, an increase of \$102,625. Capital expenditure was returned at \$2,305,730, a decrease of \$346,505.

For the month of June the revenue amounted to \$10,666,205, an increase of \$1,033,528 over June, 1910. Expenditure on account of consolidated fund was \$3,163,911, an increase of \$32,145. Capital expenditure for the month was \$1,816,555, an increase of \$163,246.

SCORES MAY HAVE DIED IN COAST WRECK

California Liner Goes on Rocks and Splits in Two.

Surf, Cal., July 8. — Second Officer E. Heuson and three seamen of the steamer Santa Rosa, of the Pacific Coast Steamship Company, which went ashore at Port Arguello yesterday, are known to have been drowned when a lifeboat capsized, while the passengers of the wrecked vessel were being taken ashore by the crew.

Early today unconfirmed reports were that a number of passengers, variously estimated at from three to twenty, are missing. Owing to the isolation of the scene of the wreck accurate information is not yet obtainable.

The known dead are: Fred Johnson, seaman; John Peltier, seaman; and E. W. Jensen, seaman. The four members of the crew all lived in San Francisco.

Lured by Searchlight.
The Santa Rosa went ashore just before dawn at the mouth of the Honda Creek. It is supposed that a powerful searchlight used by a gang of railroad robbers, who were working near the wreck, is the cause of the vessel leaving its course, the quartermaster taking it for the light of the Point Arguello lighthouse. The vessel lay at 300 yards from shore, near Saddle Rock, where the Yankee Blade was wrecked several years ago.

When the boat struck the injury did not appear to be serious, and Capt. Paria, believing he would be able to agnath float the Santa Rosa, made an attempt to land the passengers. A sharp wind rising soon threatened to break the vessel to pieces, and hasty preparations were made to take the passengers and crew ashore. At 5:30 o'clock a heavy sea cracked the vessel amidships and at 6 o'clock it split in two.

There were 275 persons on board, most of whom had taken refuge in the forward section, as the stern of the boat had received the brunt of the attack of the waves.

No Help for Hours.
The coast is bleak and uninhabited, and the signals of distress that were shown an hour before were still unheeded. It was with great difficulty that the first boat was launched soon after 6 o'clock. It was Third Engineer E. B. Brown and a woman passenger. Brown carried a line to shore, and when he had effected a landing, after a desperate battle with the waves, had arrived on shore. A net was rigged on the shore line, and passengers, women and children first, were taken from the foundering ship four at a time.

Raft Collapsed.
The disaster in which Second Officer Heuson and three seamen lost their lives, occurred just before the vessel broke in two. A lifeboat carrying five men had just put out. Heavy seas sent it crashing against the hull of the vessel. Oscar Patterson succeeded in swimming to shore, but his four companions perished.

A life raft, containing twenty women, capsized off the bow of the Santa Rosa. Darkness had fallen, and the searchlights on shore lighted the scene imperfectly, so that it could not be clearly determined whether all the women were rescued.

Fires were built from driftwood along the beach, and when the drowned survivors were landed they were given coffee and restoratives. Special trains took the survivors to Lompere, Surf, and Santa Barbara. Because of the confusion attending the forwarding of the passengers, no check could be taken to determine the number missing.
