CLIP THAT KEEPS THREAD UNTANGLED.

A very simple metal clip can used on spools to keep the thread becoming from tangled while in the work basket or lying on the table. The clip has a hole in the centre for the thread to pas through. tached to the spool by ends that fit into the holes on their

side. A portion of one edge of the clip, which is made of sheet iron or tin, can be sharpened so that it can be used to cut the thread.

Mock Venison-Cut cold mutton into hin slices and reheat in a sauce made he following way: Take 2 tablespoons of butter, 1 cup of water or stock, 2 ablespoons of flour, 1/2 cup of red currant jelly, 1 tablespoon of catsup or other meat sauce.

If such is the case, with improved conditions, the effect on the country's population would be remarkable within a short time.
