MOBILIZATION COMPLETED

Censorship of News Prevents Mentioning of Numbers Under Arms.

[Canadian Press.]

Udine, Italy, June 4, via Paris, June 5.—The censorship established on the frontier prevents the names of officers in command, the number of troops stationed on the different fronts, and even the destination of regiments or ompanies, to creep into news dispatches. The censors, however, allow news of the mobilization to be forwarded. It is now stated officially that the mobilization is complete, and that all Italian soldiers occupy posts which Lieut.-Gen. Count Cadorna designated from his office in Rome.

Only Skirmishes. Encounters with the enemy thus far are regarded as merely outpost skirmishes, which, however, are most significant, since they invariably resulted in Italian successes, allowing Italy to occupy advantageous positions in Aus-

trian territory. On both sides preparations are being made for a decisive action leading to a great battle, which, it is expected, will occur within a fortnight or three weeks.

Strongest in Friuil. It is already evident that Austria's largest number of troops are centred in Friuli, but also offer bitter resist-ance in the Province of Trent, where they are aided by strong fortifications boubtable by natura advantages of the mountainous region The Italian troops are firmly convinced that they will be victorious, and give daily exhibitions of valor. officers say that now they are merely "testing" the Austrians, with the view

About 5,000. 000 acres are to be harvested, which under ordinary circumstances, would require 2,500,000 reapers. This nowever, it is proposed to use the work of fifteen people, the number needed for the harvest is thereby reduced by 150,000. Further Reduction

The use of the machines also reduces the length of the reaping time from ten to twelve days, making a further reduction in the number of men quired by another 400,000. The 1,950,000 reapers still required will be made up boys and women and men over military age, while if absolutely necessary the Government, it is expected, will allow a certain number of peasant soldiers to return from the front for this work during the necessary twelve
