

FREEDOM OF SEAS" MORE THAN PHRASE TO THOSE WHO SEE

Pte. Fred Young Watches
Warships Guarding Coast.

STORM RAGES MEANTIME Comrades Convalescing Have Much To Talk Over Together.

While writing the following letter Pte. Fred Young had, apparently, not heard that he was to be invalided back to Canada, news that has since reached his wife. He writes in his old style, and with his old appreciation of the beauties of nature and the grandeur of the cause for which he had suffered wounds.

Shoreham by Sea,
Sussex, England,
Oct. 30, 1916.
Dear Friend—Did you ever pay much attention to the phrase that the Germans are using so much these days, about "the freedom of the seas"? Neither did we, until the other morning, when standing on a big hill at Shoreham, where the Canadian casualty assembly camp is situated, we watched the mighty breakers rolling inshore at our feet. The morning previous, we had looked across the sunlit waters of the English Channel, shining like silver in the October sunshine, as far as the eye could reach toward sunny Spain.

A Change.
But the night had brought a tremendous change, and Father Neptune was in a decidedly angry mood. A tidal wave had swept inland during the early hours of the morning, carrying away several bungalow houses, and flooding the land to a considerable depth. Far away among the foaming billows we could detect patches of black smoke, and we knew that British warships were leaping watch and ward, regardless of the storm. And as we watched ourself against the stiff breeze, our spirit leaped with pride, as we thought of the brave sailors who had done down in those very waters, in the English Channel, night after night, to live beneath the banner of freedom.

Being Rejected.
Turning our gaze landward across the South Downs valley, a truly marvellous sight presented itself. Men who had passed through hospital and convalescent stages, and had been pronounced "fit" again for active service, by the medical board, were being put through physical exercises. In squads of half battalions, the rhythmic motion of their arms and legs, all moving in unison, made an interesting scene. And when, with a wild cheer, they rushed across several lines of trenches, we could almost imagine ourselves back at Goddons. On the slopes of a hill, nearly a mile away, we could see a ship docked, and what looked at that distance like a woman hearing a big bunch of sheep across the hillside in mass formation. Swapping experiences.

We have often spoken of the shoulder touch of the boys in the trenches, and its indefinable sense of comradeship, and as we sat in the recreation-rooms of the Y. M. C. A. and the ship dock, the "reunion" of men who had hung on together in shell hole and crater, until stretcher-bearers had separated them, we again felt that indescribable thrill.

"How did you make out, that day, pal? I got it badly in the thigh, and don't know just exactly what happened after."

"But you hung on till the finish, and got the D. C. M., didn't you?"

The "pal" modestly admitted his good luck over their cups of coffee and sandwiches, they compare notes with many a hearty laugh, and the day, and brought their personal vicissitudes up to date. And all over the brilliantly-lit recreation-rooms of the Y. M. C. A. but, such scenes are a continual occurrence, as comrades meet comrades whom he had given up for lost on the battlefield or muddy trench.

The Old Battalion.
The abbreviated title of our camp is C. C. A. C. meaning "Canadian Casualty Assembly Centre," but the boys have nicknamed it "Charlie Chaplin's Army Corps," and the comrades and medical unit, who inhabit that part of the camp, known as "Happy Valley," where they await transportation back home to Canada, are the pride and envy of the whole camp.

We have had the privilege of meeting several old comrades of the "Fighting Eleventh," and learned of the splendid work the boys of that famous battalion did at the Somme. Last Friday, October 27, was our second regimental birthday anniversary, and the few of us that gathered for an anniversary reunion in the reading-room of the Y. M. C. A. hut, on that date, felt a tugging at our heartstrings, as one of the boys sang to piano accompaniment, "Where Are the Boys of the Old Brigade?" Yours as ever, FRED YOUNG.

Bottle Peddlers On King Street Offer Whiskey For Sale

But if the blind pig has been unable to emulate the greasy pig and keep out of the hands of its pursuers, there is another class of offender who has been fairly successful, according to stories told.

One man stated to The Advertiser that he was twice approached on Saturday by bottle peddlers. Two dollars was the price asked, and the peddlers were evidently taking long chances, as in neither case was the pedlar known to his prospective customer. On both occasions the offer was made on King street, but it was not accepted.

The police are watching men who give evidence of being inebriated, and endeavoring to secure information as to where they secured their liquor.

**CHARGED WITH THEFT
OF \$75 FROM BEDFELLOW**
George Booke Remanded to Jail, Pending His Trial.

George Booke, said to be an Austrian, appeared in police court today charged with the theft of \$75 from Tony Polonski, a companion, and was sent up for trial. He will receive his trial before one of the county judges on Tuesday, and was remanded to jail in the meantime.

Polonski, the complainant, testified that he and Booke were sleeping together in a small frame shack on Percy street. He had a money belt containing \$75. He placed it under his pillow, and when he awoke it was missing.

He asked Booke if he had taken the money, and he denied that he had ever touched it.

Polonski had not felt the belt removed from beneath his pillow. Witnesses further testified that no one had been in the house during the night, as the door was locked and no one was there but Booke.

John Polonski gave evidence that Booke had come to another shack, where he and some others were, and that he had seen the accused's belt in the stove, but there was no fire in the stove at the time. Witness produced a money belt, which Polonski testified was exactly like the one he had lost.

Detective Election testified that when the prisoner had been arrested he had \$150 in money in his possession, \$140 of this being in \$10 bills.

SPITAL BROTHERS PURCHASE BUILDING PREVIOUSLY RENTED

Buy Fraser-McMillan Property
for \$30,000.

ASSESSED FOR \$18,000
Purchasers Are Expected To
Spend Large Amount
On Improvements.

Spital Brothers have just completed the purchase from Alexander Fraser of the property at 333 Richmond street, occupied recently by the firm which purchased it, and previous to that time by the firm of Fraser, McMillan. The building is regarded as one of the finest wholesale locations in London.

The firm of Spital Bros. some months ago purchased the stock and goodwill of the Fraser, McMillan Company, and now complete the change by securing the building.

The property has a frontage of 25 1/2 feet by 125 feet in depth, and is three stories, with basement. It adjoins the building of the Hobbs Hardware Company. It is assessed for \$18,000, or \$7,000 for the land and \$11,000 for the building. The price paid by Spital Bros. is understood to have been \$30,000, or about \$1,200 a foot.

Spital Bros. are expected to spend a considerable amount in improvements to the place, and will concentrate their business there. They now occupy two business premises on Richmond street.

**800 LATTER DAY SAINTS
COMING TO CHURCH OPENING**

Some 800 members of the Reorganized Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints from out-of-town points in the London district are expected in the city over the next week-end for the opening of the handsome new local church on Maitland street and to hear and meet the president of the church, Frederick M. Smith, grandson of the founder and first prophet, Joseph Smith. Other prominent leaders are also to be present among these the chief bishop, Bishop McGuire, who has charge of church properties throughout the world. His training as a banker has fitted him for the administration of the secular side of the office.

Elder and Mrs. J. C. Mottashed, 725 King street, are to have the honor of entertaining the head of the church and Bishop McGuire in their home. Patriarch Squire, a prominent official of the church in the United States, will also be a guest in the home of Mrs. Mottashed, who is his daughter.

**BURNS PROVE FATAL TO
LITTLE GIRL IN HOSPITAL**
Baby Eyre Succumbs at Victoria in Spite of All Efforts to Save Her.

Although everything possible was done to save her life, Katherine Pearl Eyre, three-years-old daughter of Russell Eyre of 8 Johnston street, died in Victoria Hospital Sunday from the effects of burns received when she touched a steam radiator shortly after her birth. Members of the staff of the hospital deeply regret the accident. The child was placed near the radiator with the object of keeping it warm, in some way she struggled closer to the hot pipes, with the result that one of her legs was seriously burned.

It was at first thought that the child's life could be saved by amputating the limb, but developments seemed to point to a recovery without the need of this. At the end of the second crisis period, which came fourteen days after the accident, the child was progressing favorably.

**CARRYALL PLUNGES
INTO BRIDGE CHASM;
NINE ARE DROWNED**
Big Covered Motor Plunges 20 Feet Into Tide.

THE DRAW-BRIDGE OPEN
Tragedy Occurs Near Vancouver City, on Fraser River.

VANCOUVER, Nov. 12.—Nine persons were drowned Saturday evening five miles from Vancouver in the Fraser River. They were aboard a large covered automobile, which was on one of its regular trips from Ladner into the city. Twelve persons, including the driver, George Smith, were aboard the car. The draw-bridge was open to allow a tug to pass up the Fraser, and the big automobile plunged through the gates and over into the tideway, 20 feet below.

Thirty of the passengers were immediately picked up, two of them by the crew. They were Thomas Shortreed, H. A. Hutchinson and a 5-year-old daughter of Henry Evans of North Vancouver. During Sunday all but two of the bodies were recovered. The known dead are: Thomas Marshall and A. Steward, manager and engineer, respectively, of the evaporating plant at Ladner; Mrs. Evans and daughter Lorna, who are mother and sister of the little girl who was saved; R. Wilcox and Ken Ritchie, young men of Ladner; Miss Annie Brown of Vancouver, and a Chinaman. There was doubt this evening of the identity of the two women.

Why the car smashed through the gate and leaped into the river is unexplained, and perhaps will remain so, for the driver is dead. It was a fine, clear night, and the red lights, warning that the swing was open, burned brightly. Isaac Gordon, the bridge tender, saw the car coming at high speed, and swung his lantern back and forth across the highway, but the car kept on at full speed, and bounded through the gate, leaping into space.

Time for Deutschland's Departure Still Uncertain—Everything Ready.

NEW LONDON, Conn., Nov. 12.—The time of the departure of the German submarine Deutschland was still uncertain tonight, although everything apparently has been in readiness since Saturday for a quick dash to sea. At the customs house it was said the manifest had not yet been filed, but that this formality together with the issuance of the clearance papers would occupy only a short time.

There were more rumors today that the British cruisers were outside the three-mile limit waiting for the Deutschland, and that two German war submarines were off the coast to convey the boat back to Germany. There was no confirmation.
