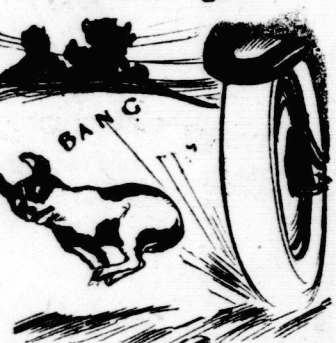

COUNTY PUPILS TO PAY ACTUAL COST OF EDUCATION HERE
Amounts To \$4.41 Per Capita Per Month—Fourteen New Teachers.

Parents of children residing outside the city limits may send them to London public schools provided that they pay the actual cost per capita of teaching pupils here. This amounts to \$4.41 per month. No. 1 committee of the board of education decided at a meeting Friday afternoon to allow outside children to attend city schools on this basis, members expressing themselves as willing at any time to confer with county officials in the subject. The committee also decided to pay its share of the municipal election expenses last January, which sum will be deducted from the revenue of the board of education, derived from rental of schoolrooms to the city for polling booths last election day. The recommendation of Acting Public School Inspector V. K. Greer that eight new teachers be appointed to the permanent staff, and that six teachers who previously acted as substitutes be given permanent classes was approved. The new teachers are: Garnet C. Francis, Marion Grant, Lillian Hoffman, Minnie C. Runnians, B.A. Myrta Taylor, Mae Beckton, Gwendolyn Sereation and Annie Hoggan. Substitutes teachers appointed permanent to schools are: Lillian Beaton, Hilda Rogers, Mary Ashton, Dora Barr, Edith Dean and Mildred Hamill. With one exception these appointments are all Londoners, and their duties will commence September 1, next.

POSTPONEMENT OF SUBURBAN APPEALS

Action Deferred On Protests of City Against Reduction Allowed.

Appeals registered by the City of London against decisions of the court of revision awarding Knollwood Park residents a reduction of \$11,000 on their sewer, and Egerton street residents a reduction of \$1,200 on their sewer, were slated for hearing before County Judge Talbot MacBeth, presiding at the court, Friday, but the hearing was postponed until June 30, with the consent of all parties concerned. Appeals of R. H. Peck and A. E. Hayward against income taxation were not allowed, because they should have been made against the 1920 assessment. Through erroneous information given to the Advertiser Friday by a clerk of the court, it was stated in this paper that the Knollwood Park and Egerton street sewer appeals had been sustained, with the court of revision decisions thrown out, and original assessment confirmed. The city council offered to extend the ten-year debentures for the Knollwood Park sewer to thirty years, but the committee selected by property owners of that district did not feel disposed to pay interest on these debentures for the extra twenty years. The council would not vote to have other citizens pay this interest, which is not provided for in the estimates, and following the decision of the court of revision reducing the assessment by \$11,000, appealed the case, which will be heard by Judge MacBeth June 30.

PLAYGROUNDS TO BE OPENED TODAY

Eight Recreation Centres in All For Children of the City.

London's eight playgrounds will be officially opened for the 1921 season today, with an absence of ceremonial, the children just gathering on the scene for a merry time. While many of the playgrounds have been in full swing for a few weeks, Queen's Park will be opened for the first time completely equipped this season today. In addition to the eight civic playgrounds there is a play centre at Sunshine Park, North London, levelled and equipped by Roman Catholic nuns, which is open to all children of that district. The supervisors appointed for the various playgrounds have been assigned as follows: Bottill property playground, West London, Miss Jessie McFarlane and W. A. Thomas; Burkett's Flats, J. Campbell and Miss M. Foster; Lord Roberts school, Miss Edith Anderson and G. A. Wainwright and J. O. Dockstater, night supervisors; Queen's Park, Miss Elva Haskett and E. M. Dundas; Riverview school, Miss Beula Fitzgerald and C. A. Chapman; Tecumseh school, Miss Annie Beckton and J. A. Sifton; Thames Park, Miss Edith Ryce and H. A. MacMahon; Lorne avenue school, F. James, days and nights. Burkett's Flats bathing camp, Long, north branch bathing camp under Mr. and Mrs. J. Nicholson.

JUDGMENT RESERVED IN CASE OVER STABLE

Action of Carolina Hicks Against George Chandler is Concluded.

Judgment was reserved in the non-jury case of Hicks vs. Chandler at the county court by Judge J. C. Cudd on Friday afternoon.

U. S. WOULD LIKE TO ABROGATE PULPWOOD EXPORT RESTRICTIONS

WASHINGTON, June 17.—A resolution authorizing the president to open negotiations with Canada for abrogation of provincial and Dominion regulations restricting exportation of pulpwood to the United States passed the Senate today, and was sent to the House.

COMPLETION OF NEW MAUSOLEUM
Beautiful Structure in Woodland Cemetery Is Second Largest in Canada.

Woodland Mausoleum will stand forever and ever. This impression is far amount among the many that are left, indelible in the mind of anyone who makes an inspection of the stately pile, which, after months of careful planning and careful construction, is now complete. Only a few finishing touches remain to be made. Granite, marble and bronze—of these three materials, which so far as mortal man knows, are invulnerable inas much as the attacks of the elements are concerned, is the building constructed. Considering the building as a work of art, one cannot help but remark that it is beautiful in the extreme. The beauty lies in the simplicity of its lines.

Greek in Design.
The structure is entirely Greek in design. Each of the five large pillars which are in the construction of the facade weighs six tons. One of the stones used in the upper portion of the facade weighs ten tons. The entire building is constructed and ventilated by the Greek system of construction and ventilation. It is so ventilated that each crypt receives a steady flow of dry air. This air in time will cause the casket, which the remains are placed to crumble to dust and leave the remains in their natural state. After being sealed in a crypt for two and a half years a body in a mausoleum in the United States was found to be in as good condition as it was when placed there.

The windows of the mausoleum, which are of opalescent glass, are all symbolic of life, rather than death. As one enters the crypt, the building and moves forward, one sees a window showing the figure of the Saviour coming out of the tomb. Below is inscribed: "I ascend unto my Father, and your Father, to God, and your God," a quotation from the 20th Chapter of the Gospel according to St. John. This window is at the front of the chapel, where services have been held in a rock and a face of the figure that is painted in the face. The rest is made up of multi-colored glass.

Four other windows show the rising sun, the rising moon, the setting sun and the setting moon.

Roof of Concrete.
The whole exterior of the building, with the exception of the roof, which is of concrete and the shutters of the ventilating system, which are of bronze, is of granite. Some of the marble used in the walls is only sprung from the appearance of petrified quarter-cut oak. High authorities have admitted that the custom of placing the bodies in a mausoleum is the correct one. The interment idea only sprung from the fall of the Roman Empire. The Saviour, it is argued, was not placed in the earth, but was laid away in a tomb, which Joseph of Arimathea had been for himself in a rock and it is contended, nowhere in the Bible is found the phrases "ashes to ashes" and "dust to dust." After the funeral service in the chapel the casket is placed in the crypt, which is an oblong apartment in the wall. Then a marble slab is fitted into a slot in the opening and sealed, the operation taking only a few minutes. Any inscription that the family desires can be placed on the slab. There are 582 crypts in the mausoleum. Twelve of these are more elaborate than the others, being set back a few feet and having bronze gates in front of them. An endowment fund is being established, so that even if a family becomes extinct or the relatives of the deceased move to another part of the world, the place will be given care perpetually.

The idea of this modern form of burial, which is a revival and improvement of the form in the period when the Roman Empire ruled the world, seems to have met with favor here, for already sixteen local physicians have purchased crypts.

Will Construct Driveway.
Within a short time a winding driveway leading to the portals of the building will be constructed.

All the materials for the building were secured from the McIntosh Granite Company at Beebeville, Que.; the marble from the Vermont Marble Company at Peterboro, Ont.; the bronze work from the Dennis Wire and Iron Company, London, and the windows from the Luxfer Prism Company.

Three other similar edifices have been built at Chatham, Toronto and Windsor. The local one is 114 feet long and 70 feet from front to rear.

When one places a loved one tenderly away in one of the crypts, one does not feel that the deceased is loved in death, but that he or she slumbers there in natural state until Judgment Day.

Second largest in Canada, the Woodland Mausoleum stands—and will stand down through the centuries—a fitting monument to the beloved departed.

IMPORTANT ADMISSION MADE BY WITNESS IN STILLMAN DIVORCE CASE

Mrs. Stillman's Counsel Well Pleased With Friday's Hearing.

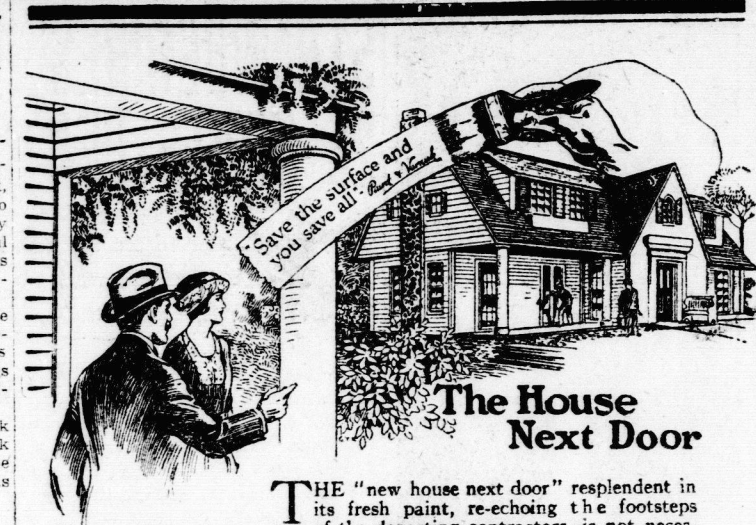
POUGHKEEPSIE, June 17.—Attorneys for James A. Stillman strove to prove today the bankers claim that Guy Stillman is illegitimate, but before the cross-examination of one of their principal witnesses had closed, it was brought out for the first time that Mr. Stillman and the wife he is suing for divorce lived together under the same roof on two Sundays within the period considered important in establishing the paternity of Mrs. Stillman's 31-months-old son.

Her counsel appeared pleased that the proceedings of the day had resulted in a strong possibility of the elimination of the entire testimony of Dr. Hugh L. Russell, osteopath, of Buffalo, N. Y. It was he who testified that Mrs. Stillman told him before the birth of Guy Stillman that Fred Beaulieu, a part-Indian guide employed by Mr. Stillman, was the child's father.

On the ground that these statements were made by Mrs. Stillman while under treatment, and were therefore privileged as between a patient and doctor, her lawyers asked that the entire testimony of the osteopath be stricken out. Referee Gleason took the matter under advisement and promised to give his decision on June 28, when hearings are resumed here.

"Little Black Bear." Mary Olive Gagan, the nurse who attended Mrs. Stillman at the birth of Guy on November 7, 1918, testified that the banker's wife directed her on that day to telegraph Beaulieu a message saying: "Little black bear has arrived." She added that Mrs. Stillman had also asked her at the same

time to "locate Mr. Stillman and request him to visit her." It was learned tonight that Mrs. Stillman had told her attorneys that during the summer of 1918 while she and her children were near Grand Anse, Quebec, where Beaulieu was employed at their camp, it was agreed that when the expected infant arrived messages would be sent to all the children and to the guide. Should the baby be a girl the message would say: "White bear has arrived," and if a boy "Black bear has arrived." This, it was understood, the defence expects to establish later in the case.

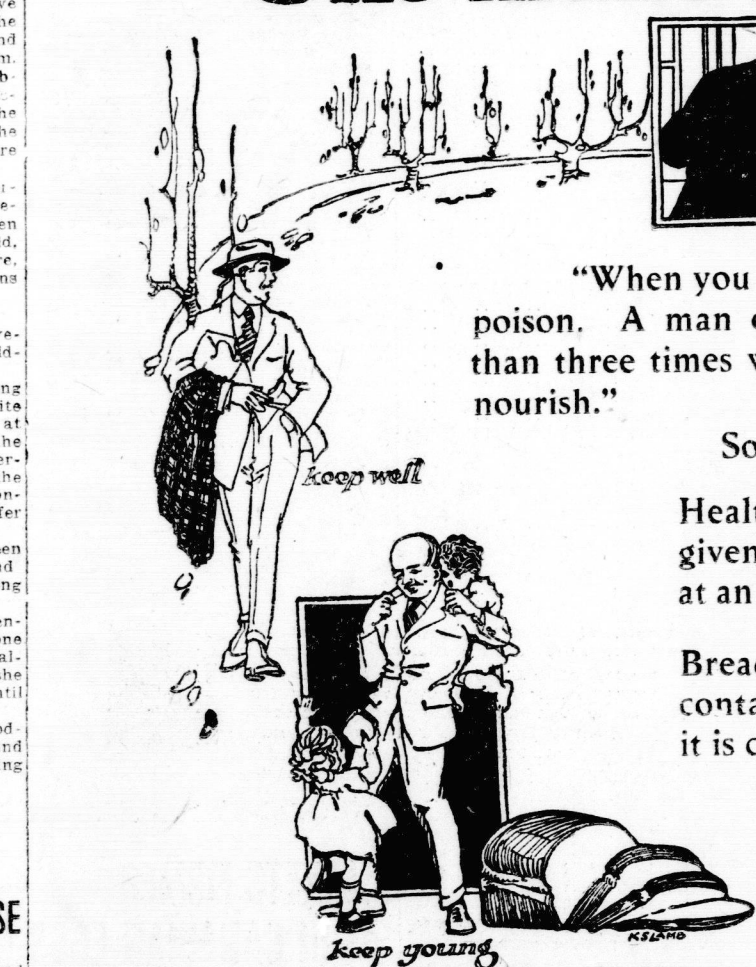

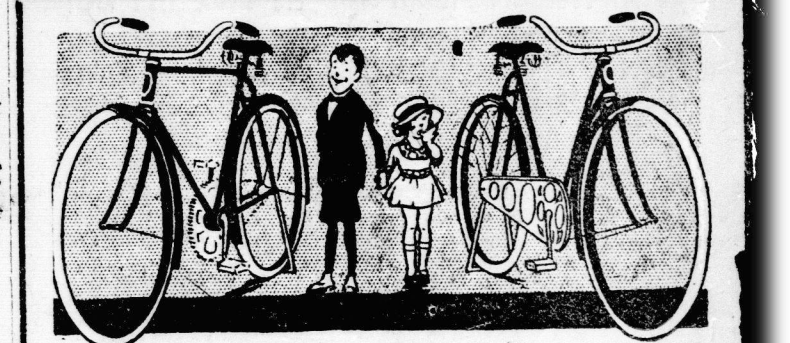
