Balkwell proved in Stratford Wednesday his possibilities and turned in a very good performance. His mates fielded cleverly and played good baseball all through the game.

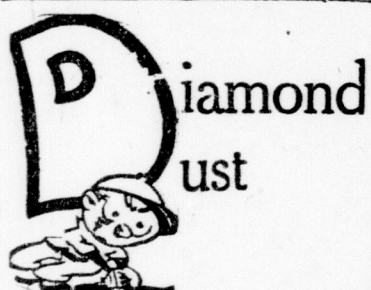
The locals with the feeling that the game means so much to them are out to win and therefore the contest should be well worth witnessing.
