

ATTACK ON PRINCE IS UTER FAILURE

Laborite's Attempt To Stop
Trip To South Africa Is
Defeated.

LABOR PARTY SPLITS

Associated Press Despatch.
London, Feb. 12.—The House of Commons this evening by a vote of 295 against 87 passed a supplementary budget estimate to cover the expenses of the forthcoming trip of the Prince of Wales to South Africa and South America.

The vote was taken after the chamber had rejected a motion by David Kirkwood, Labor member for the Dumfriesshire burghs to reduce the £16,000 which it has been estimated will be required for the trip. The vote on this question was 304 against 90.

In the division against the motion of Mr. Kirkwood, former premier Ramsay MacDonald, Sydney Webb and William Adamson, as well as James H. Thomas, Labor members, voted with the government. Stephen Walsh, Noel Hincks and Arthur Henderson, also Laborites, abstained from voting.

To Chil, Too.
During the debate the government sprang a surprise on the members of parliament and the country at large by an announcement that Uruguay and Chile had also invited the Prince of Wales to visit those countries. The government spokesman, Walter Edwards Guinness, said he hoped that these invitations would be accepted. Mr. Kirkwood protested against spending the nation's resources on the trip of the Prince of Wales while there was so much poverty at home. Mr. Kirkwood appeared to be suffering under the annoyance that on the occasion of one of the prince's visits to Glasgow the prince had not responded to his invitation to inspect Glasgow's slum districts. The chairman had much difficulty in keeping Mr. Kirkwood to the point, and during the member's speech the proceedings became rather noisy.

House Amused.
Mr. Kirkwood's strictures caused more laughter than indignation, and what was considered by some of the members, the only regrettable note came with insinuations from Mr. Kirkwood and others that financial interests were involved in the prince's tour.

As an instance, George Lansbury, Labor member for the Bow and Bromley division of Poplar, said he had yet to learn that it was a function of royalty to go around the world as commercial bagmen doing trade. The only sort of trade the Prince of Wales seemed to have done on his American tour, Mr. Lansbury said, was the trade of amusement. He was going on his forthcoming tour, as far as the speaker could see, to have a good time. He would not judge the prince the trip, but it would be a standing disgrace to spend money for the trip while thousands were on the borderline of subsistence.

E. C. DRURY VISIONS BIGGER WET PERIL

Amendment Will Create An
Alcohol Appetite, Former
Premier Thinks.

Toronto, Feb. 12.—"If the beer is to be sold as freely as the present Ontario temperance act beer I regard its sale as a greater peril than the old license bar," declared former Premier E. C. Drury today in strongly condemning the proposed change in the O. T. A. Whether or not the new beer would be strong enough to produce intoxication, he thought it at least would be strong enough to create an appetite for alcohol. He said he intended to fight the measure by every means in his power.

DRY FORCES FIRM.

Toronto, Feb. 12.—Intensified by the political development of the last few days, interest in the annual convention of the Ontario prohibition union, which opens here next Tuesday, is now very keen, and Rev. John Bailey, who has charge of the program, stated this afternoon that prospects were bright for a record-breaking attendance.

"The situation is one that calls for coolness of head as well as determination of purpose," he declared. Many questions of importance regarding the future of the temperance cause in Ontario will come up for discussion, including the shaping of the temperance policy with regard to the recent amendment doubling the strength of beer. This will be discussed on Wednesday morning when the reports from the various ridings will also be presented, showing the attitude of the electors toward this question.

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LIBERAL LEADER ASKS LEGISLATURE TO CENSURE PREMIER FOR IGNORING DEFINITE PROMISES TO THE PEOPLE

Sinclair Moves Amendment To Speech From Throne, Calling
For Vote of Lack of Confidence Because of Violation of
Promises Regarding Ontario Temperance Act.

OPPOSITION PARTIES MAY UNITE IN SUPPORT

Liberal Chieftain Also Calls For Full Explanation of Settling
Charges and Probe of Bond and Commissions Scandal
in Relation To Tory Government.

RANEY WILL NOT SPEAK UNTIL TUESDAY

Toronto, Feb. 12.—Without committing themselves to any declaration on the merits of the otherwise government proposed amendment to the O. T. A., the Liberals today moved an amendment to the reply to the speech from the throne, accusing the prime minister of making a direct violation of his pledge regarding the act.

W. E. N. Sinclair, Liberal leader, moved the amendment at the close of a two-hour address touching all the points in the speech from the throne. The text of the amendment follows: "That the following paragraph be added to the reply: 'And this house views with disapproval the direct violation of the pledge given by the prime minister of Ontario to the people by the government suggesting legislation to amend the Ontario temperance act.'"

W. E. Raney, leader of the Progressives, will not speak until the debate is resumed next Tuesday. He may propose an amendment to the amendment. If he does not, Liberals and Progressives will probably unite in support of the Liberal amendment.

The Original Promises.

Mr. Sinclair said the premier had stated in his New Year message, that "character, intelligence and integrity" were required in men of public service.

He quoted statements made by Premier Ferguson before the vote on the liquor question, some of which were: "Prohibition must be put in the hands of the people by vote." "The Conservative Party is not going back on its own self-sprung." "We will not change the act one iota until the people demand that a change be made." Mr. Sinclair quoted from letters written to Rev. Dr. T. Albert Moore, to the effect that if the people voted in favor of the Ontario temperance act the government would strengthen the act. After the vote the premier was quoted by Mr. Sinclair as stating that the government was determined to pursue a consistent course and that the majority would prevail, and "no self-respecting government could but accept the situation."

"I think the government has voted itself out of the self-respecting class," said Mr. Sinclair. "The rules were made with the representatives of both sides present and the vote was taken and I think that the only fair thing to do is to stand by the rules after the game is played," said Mr. Sinclair.

Government Is Lost.

"The government today doesn't know what position it is in or what it is going to do, so how can it criticize its final action," said Mr. Sinclair. "Don't sidestep," said the premier. "I can't sidestep," rejoined Mr. Sinclair, who declared that the question to be discussed at this time was: "Is the word of a public man no longer to be taken as a word to be carried out? It is a sorry day for Ontario when we cannot accept the word of public men on public questions. This proposal is a challenge to the word given by the prime minister, and he cannot escape, and on every member of his government must fall equal blame." He challenged the government to now what your position is on this question," the premier interjected. "When I speak I will choose my own subject, and if it becomes my duty to speak I will speak to the side," said Mr. Sinclair. "The thing for us to consider now is: Is the word of a public man no longer to be taken as a word to a public question? We are now discussing the broken pledge of the premier to Ontario. When the government bill comes down we will discuss it."

Demands Probe.

Mr. Sinclair then made his demand for an investigation of the commission paid by the Home Bank to someone for loans during the later days of the Hoagland government. He quoted evidence from last year's public accounts committee to show that \$42,000 had been paid out. "It is up to the government to clear it up," he stated.

"We have nothing to conceal and nobody to protect or hide," said the premier. The matter was before the public accounts committee last year. "Mr. McGarry was there several times and gave evidence. If the Liberal leader will not make insinuations, but make charges this government will see that he gets a proper tribunal to hear those charges."

Mr. Sinclair argued that it was the duty of the legislature to finish the investigation already started. He said in to the prime minister, Mr. Sinclair said: "If you lay down the reins of office to me I'll soon find out the truth about these matters."

Mr. Sinclair declared the Ontario government was "passing the buck" regarding the unemployment situation.

He accused the prime minister as minister of education, of allowing politics to interfere with the administration of schools, and demanded that a fair proportion of the revenue to be raised under the tax on gasoline be turned over to the municipalities.

He demanded that the Settling letter, making charges against the hydro administration should be published in full, and that the government should investigate and clear up the mystery concerning the payments of money as commission by the Home Bank to someone for provincial loans during the last days of the Conservative administration before the Drury government came into power.

The premier, interrupting, said he would let Mr. Sinclair see the Settling letter, and if then he demanded it be produced, that it would be laid on the table of the house. He asked Mr. Sinclair to make definite charges regarding the commission alleged to have been paid to someone for the government in 1910, and said he would provide proper tribunal for the hearing of such charges.

Sift Cost of Living.
Mr. Sinclair also asked for a commission to investigate the spread in food prices between the producer and

the consumer. He hoped that the agricultural committee could deal with it. He accused Frank Keefe, secretary for Northern Ontario, and the advisory road committee of playing politics in their duties. Referring to the change in the leadership of the Progressive party, the Liberal leader said that if Mr. Raney was elected until Mr. Drury was elected to the legislature he would have a long wait.

The present government, he said, was continuously "passing the buck" and crying that it was hampered by the administration of other governments. This was not a courageous attitude.

Regarding the speech itself, he thought it just an exaggerated advertisement for the doing or misdoing of the government.

Speaking of the proposal to spread early university training to the schools of the province, he said that the government must be sure that the increased cost did not fall upon the municipalities.

He wondered if the government was getting lukewarm on hydro; that great service, he declared, must be maintained. Regarding the charges made in the Settling letters against the hydro, Mr. Sinclair said the man in the street was wondering why the whole letter was not published.

Sir Adam Cleared.

"We are glad to know there was no reflection on Sir Adam Beck, and nobody expected there would be," said Mr. Sinclair.

When Mr. Ferguson said he would

show the letter to the Liberal leader and produce it in the house if required, the Liberal leader said he was glad to see the premier growing penitent.

On his proposal that a portion of the money collected from the gasoline tax should go to the municipalities, Mr. Sinclair suggested that the money should be kept separate from consolidated revenue and paid to municipalities so that it could be spent on all roads, and not merely on the main highways.

Mr. Sinclair said he agreed with the attitude of the Liberal Party in Ontario, who yesterday moved an amendment to the speech from the throne calling upon the House to censure Premier Ferguson for violating his promises to the people.

"Scandal."

In "Scandal," Cosmo Hamilton's comedy drama, which closes its run at the Majestic theatre Saturday night, the author has contrived a plausible and interesting story. It is based on the trouble that well-meaning persons find themselves in when they are caught breaking present-day conventions.

At first this may sound like a sad story. In truth it is quite the opposite. The author shows that a little erring from the narrow confines so severely outlined by the Puritans has its funny side; that the discovery leads to a certain embarrassment, also with its touch of comedy. When the trouble is over and gone there is left the bitter-sweet taste known only to those who love to take a chance.

An attractive young woman, who feels cramped and hemmed in by convention, decides to take a fling at the life bohemian. To be sure, she does not go far. She runs up to the attic studio of an artist friend for a little visit. This takes place at night. It is sufficient to let loose the violent tongues among her friends.

The young woman is not altogether blameless. One of the strongest features of the play is the manner in which the author has depicted the character of the so-called "spoiled girl."

Miss Peggy Condray handles the part in a masterly fashion. Edward Cullen plays opposite as the unfortunate young man who, through no fault of his own was brought into an embarrassing situation, that is the bedroom scene.
