SENTENCE IS DEFERRED IN BANK BANDIT'S CASE

Crown Asks For Maximum Penalty in Case of Percy B. White. Canadian Press Despatch. Toronto, Aug. 19.—Magistrate Jones in police court today reserved judgment in the case of Percy B. White, who confessed to attempted robbery of a branch of the Imperial Bank at Kingston road and Balsam avenue on Aug. 10. White escaped from the bank with a little over \$1,000, but was captured a few minutes later, chiefly through the pursuit of the bank's teller, J. H. Cremer. White pleaded "guilty" to the charges.
