Giant From Argentina the Favorite, Though Sentiment Is With Willard.

RUSH FOR TICKETS Expect Largest Assembly

Fans in History Will See Interesting Battle.

BY HENRY L. FARRELL. Special to The Advertiser. Jersey City, N. J., July 12,-Four of the biggest mitts on the American continent will flail through the night air here, driving for a shot at the million-dollar heavyweight championship, when Jess Willard, the giant of Nort.. America, and Luis Firpo the mammoth of South America, pull their bulk through the ropes Boyle's Thirty Acres tonight Before a crowd that probably will

run close to 100,000, the former heavyweight champion and the caveman from Argentine will battle twelve rounds to decide the next opponent for the discredited world's champion, Jack Dempsey. Expecting the biggest and perhaps the greatest heavyweight fight of years, thousands swarmed into Jersey City today, and thousands more were waiting across the Hudson in New York to take a late dash through the tubes for the scene of the battle.

Rush for Tickets. The quest for tickets was much greater and more earnest than on the previous occasion here when Dempsey and Carpentier were get-ting ready for the first battle of the century. Representatives of Rickard were here picking spots for the circus wagons from which would pass out one dollar and two dollar seats, starting at 5 o'clock this afternoon. The wagons were followed by swarms who were ready to grab off first position in the line.

Rickard announced that 35,000 of the choice seats nad been sold and that 25,000 cheaper seats in the reserve sections were available. He predicted that all the reserved seats would be sold hours before the gates f the big pine arena are opened. Frank Hague, mayor of Jersey City, announced that all arrangements have been completed to handle what may turn out to be the biggest

MAKE GENERAL BOOST IN RATES AT MARKET

Finance Committee Moves To Get More Money From Rentals.

Members of the finance committee are out to reap further financial re-turns through the medium of the market and buildings thereon, and ecommendations for a general boost in rates have gone to the council. 
