DR. STEVENSON THINKS STREET RAILWAY WRONG

Former Member Declares the Argument Over Bill Is Unwarranted.

The London Street Railway is wrong in its present contention, according to Dr. Hugh A. Stevenson, who was member for London sup-porting the Drury administration the 5-cent fare was granted. Canadian Press Despatch. Montreal, Oct. 25 .- To aid in the rapid movement of grain from Great Lake ports to Montreal, St. John and Halifax, the Canadian National and Halifax, the Canadian National Railways are now placing in service 1,000 box cars of a new type.

By means of special axle design, and improvements in the general design of the car itself, these new cars will be able to carry \$1 tons, or more than 2,000 bushels of grain each. This marks a considerable advance on the average type of box car, whose loading capacity is, with new axle design, about 46 tons, or approximately 1,500 bushels of grain.
