Mr. Fielding gives notice of an increased sessional indemnity to \$2,500 for senators and members, and Mr. Borden is to receive an allowance of \$7,000 over and above his sessional in-demnity. Members are to have \$15 de-incted for eveny day they are absent. Nanaimo, July 15.—Nominations for the by-election passed off quietly this af-ternoon at Alberni without incident as follows: W. Manson, jr., accountant, Nanaimo (Conservative) Mr. Borden is to receive an allowance of \$7,000 over and above his sessional in-demnity. Members are to have \$15 de-ducted for every day they are absent. Members' mileage is cut off and instead they are only allowed the actual travel-ing expenses. This is quite a difference to British Columbia senators and mem-bers. Members will be paid monthly only and must make a sworn statement of their attendance before the clerk of Premier Laurier has not been given yet, but it is understood the figure will be \$12,000. Judges of superior and county courts of all the provinces will receive an increase of salaries. Each superior court judge will receive an increase of two thousand.

This was followed by negotiations for a new Ger-man Russian treaty, under which Ger-many gets notable advantages. France therefore will send a delegation of lead-ing officials to St. Petersburg to co-oper-ate with M. Bompard, the French am-bassador, in securing a treaty which will give French products rates and facilities equal to those given to Germany.
