TWELFTH YEAR.

SIR JOHN LIVES. At Daylight This Morning the End Had Not Come.

THAT THE PREMIER IS WEAKER. The Unequal Battle Likely to Terminate To-Day.

IN THE OPINION OF THE PHYSICIANS. Unmistakable Lowering of the Vital Forces.

A Hopeful Rumor, Which was Speedily Dissipated. The Previous Attacks of the Premier—How the News of the Chief's Illness was Received in England—Views as to Succession—A Couple of Meetings of the Cabinet Held.

OTTAWA, June 2, 8:30 a.m.—The despatch which tells of the Premier's condition tonight indicates that there is little hope of his living until another sun shall set.

OTTAWA, June 1.—At 6:45 this morning Dr. Powell issued the following:

Sir John slept more usual during the night. His symptoms this morning as I write show no change from yesterday.

Dr. Grant and Dr. Powell still in the night. Leaving Dr. Powell still in the night.

A close examination of Sir John Macdonald's condition this morning shows that he has been steadily improving since he was taken to the hospital.

Rev. J. J. Boyer of Belleville, Sir John's former pastor, has been in the city since his return from the States.

The Premier's Previous Attacks. In 1870 Sir John was prostrated for four weeks and for some time was at the point of death.

The Premier passed the day marked by periods of more than usual depression. He has taken a course of medicine, my best course in his case.
