The Behring Sea Bill Read a Second Time in the Commons.

LONDON, June 1.-William Henry Smith, in the Iouse of Commons to-day, moved that the tehring Sea bill be read a second time. Great iritain, he said, had endeavored to arrive at a friendly conclusion with a kindred power and had practically succeeded in so doing. If they were not practically succeeded in so doing.
