Cyrus Captures the Contest for 35-footers

In the 15-foot class

The R.C.Y.C. races for 35-footers, which

was sailed on Saturday, were well

though perhaps not keenly contested.

Three yachts entered, Vidette, sailed

by Mr. Jarvis, Emma, sailed by Mr. Per-

val, and Cyrus, sailed by Mr. Thompson.

The wind was light from the south-

west, and the course the usual one round

the island.

As the starting gun fired, the Emma

crossed the line, closely followed by the

Cyrus and Vidette. Cyrus worked to

weather and rounded the island buoy

first. Through the western channel and

along the island shore no change was

made in the yachts' relative positions.

At the lake the wind fell very light

and the Cyrus soon pulled out a long

lead, doing great weather work in the

light air. Vidette's small spinnaker

soon threw her out of the race, but

Emma pulled up a little on the run from

the eastern gap. Cyrus crossed first at

5:11.1, Emma second at 5:32.50 and

Vidette third at 5:56.

The Cyrus looked very ship-shape in

her new suit of canvas, which fitted like

a board. She has had her copper stripped

off and been thoroughly overhauled

since last year. If her sailing on Satur-

day goes for anything, she should give

a cracking good account of herself dur-

ing the summer.
