Mr. Waddell was 42 years old, and for a great many years lived in Nilestown. He was prominent in Masonic circles, and a member of Nilestown Lodge. Besides his wife, Mrs. Armanda Waddell, he is survived by two sons, Bruce and Arden, at home; two brothers and three sisters, William, of Kerwood, and James, of Port Arthur; Mrs. J. The remains were taken to Kerwood Saturday afternoon, and the funeral was held under Masonic auspices, to Strathroy cemetery on Monday. The bride travelled in a tailored suit of navy blue broadcloth with hat to match. On their return the young couple will reside in London.


