Her feet was cold, and we put het bricks to them before he came. She did not sweat any : she breathed very hard; her breathing was indeed hard enough; hard and rapid and strong, as if from the bottom of her bally. Her countenance was sometimes pale, sometime flushed, her limbs would remain in almost any position in which they were placed. Dr. Dickinson said they were poisoned. Dr. Rattray said they were not. Dr. Pringle also saw them before they died. I think he agreed with Dr. Rattray. He said that Sarah's iliness was probably caused by going out into the rold, wet grass, barefooted, or something of that kind.
