THEFT OF COBALT CONCENTRATE AT DELORO. ONT.

On the orders of the day:

Mr. Eric A. Winkler (Grey-Bruce): Mr. Speaker, I should like to ask the Prime Minister or the Minister of Industry whether they have a reply today regarding the theft of cobalt concentrates at Deloro, Ontario.

Hon. C. M. Drury (Minister of Industry): Mr. Speaker, as I think the House learned yesterday, there has been a theft of cobalt from Deloro Mining and Smelting Company of Ontario. The matter is now under investigation by the provincial police. Perhaps it would suffice for the moment to say that this cobalt was the property of the Federal Government and was in storage in custody of the Deloro Mining and Smelting Company in consequence of a storage contract entered into for the custody and safekeeping of the material.

Under this contract the company was required to certify quarterly to the Government as to the inventory on hand. The most recent certificate dated April 1 of this year, indicated that as of April 1 the full amount of the cobalt was on hand. Since then the company has discovered that a large part of it is missing. The Ontario provincial police, who were originally called in, are now conducting an intensive investigation.

Mr. R. N. Thompson (Red Deer): A supplementary question. In view of my question yesterday in regard to this matter and the answer today by the Minister, can the Minister inform the House whether such a storage contract involved any bond coverage on the part of those responsible for storage, or was this valuable and strategic material covered by any insurance in case of theft such as that which has now been revealed?

Mr. Drury: Mr. Speaker, Deloro Mining and Smelting Company is, as I think the House is aware, a reputable operating company. There is no provision which required the company to insure or bond against theft in the contract for storage.
