Will the government, in view of the detrimental effects on the City of Moose Jaw by the removal of some large industries, give favourable consideration to declaring that City a designated area?

Mr. Russell C. Honey (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Forestry and Rural Development): On September 25 the Minister of Forestry and Rural Development announced that he was reviewing the whole area development program with a view to new legislation early next year. This review will take into account the situation in areas such as Moose Jaw that cannot be designated under the existing program. Meanwhile officers of the department are assisting provincial and municipal officials in the attempt to attract new industrial activity to Moose Jaw.
