critically underutilized, and the energies, skills, will and enterprise to transform those resources into needed and desired products for the benefit of Canadians, and also a significant surplus to assist in meeting the requirements of others around the world.

We all remember the spirit of 1967 when Canadians were urged to let down their hair and celebrate 100 years of history. As we remember, the result was a great program all across the country, a promotional program which resulted in demonstrations, building projects, excitement, concerts, and a new awareness of what Canada was all about. At that time the satisfaction was real; the expectations were high as we faced the second century. But the question now is: what has happened? Instead of a buoyant and vibrant economy and happy, optimistic and enthusiastic people, we have a no-growth econo-

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my and a population which is uncertain, apprehensive and disturbed.

In addition, instead of having a spirit of unity and harmony in this nation from sea to sea, the country is divided and struggling to maintain its equilibrium. What has happened over those few years?

Perhaps when I resume the debate tomorrow we will be able to consider this further.
