Hundred Delegates Representing Evangelical Move-  
ment Are in Attendance.

SOMERSET, Pa., April 12.—John  
and Joseph D'Angelo, cousins, were  
shot and killed, and Mrs. Frank  
D'Angelo, Joseph's mother, was  
dangerously wounded at Somerset, near  
here, today.

Mrs. D'Angelo was awakened by  
the sound of shooting, and hurrying  
to the rear of the house fell over  
the bodies of the boys. She stooped  
to lift one of them when a fusillade  
of shots came out of the darkness.  
She crawled back to the kitchen and  
gave the alarm.

Seven persons were arrested; five  
of them blood relatives of the D'Angelo  
family. The boys were returning  
home from Easter festivities at the  
house of a friend. The police know  
no motive for the assassination.

**COMMENCE WORK ON

C. N. R.'s New Saskatchewan  
Branch Will Tap Thick-  
ly Populated District.

Announcement was made by the  
Canadian Northern Railway yesterday  
that construction will be begun this  
year on the C. N. R. western line from  
Oliver to St. Paul de Metis, which is  
guaranteed by the Saskatchewan  
Government for 149 miles.

The work of cutting the  
right of way had been continued thir-  
ty miles, and is now practically  
completed. The line will run thru a  
thickly populated agricultural dis-  
trict.
