SYNOD REFUSED TO ADOPT BANISH-BAR RESOLUTION

Committee on Temperance and Social Reform Left to Deal With Important Question—Change in Church Name Stands for Consideration.

James Edmund Jones' motion "that in the opinion of this synod the title 'The Church of England in Canada,' is not a correct description of the church, and is not the best name that can be devised, received some severe opposition in the synod yesterday.

Mr. Jones further explained that the name "Church of England" was sometimes more or less detrimental to the acquisition of new members to the church, especially in the western provinces. His motion was seconded by Archbishop Inglis.

Mr. Jones' motion to the effect that "in the opinion of the Anglican Synod, the time was now ripe for a sweeping measure for the abolition of the bar" also received more or less opposition.
