TO FOLLOW ABERDEEN.
A Startling Rumor Current in Montreal About Sir Charles Tupper

HE MAY BE OUR GOVERNOR-GENERAL.
British Government Said to Be Favorable to This Proposition.

Reported to Have Been Advanced by Hon. Joseph Chamberlain—It Would Be a Compliment to the Loyalty of Canada as Well as to Colonial Statecraft—Remember That Sir Donald Smith Invented This News to Premier Laurier, Who in Turn Informed His Colleagues.

Montreal, July 31.—(Special.)—A very startling rumor became current here to-day, and while at first it was believed by a few there were many who thought there might be something in it after all, especially when the evening papers had published a report of Hon. Mr. Mulock's speech at Aurora yesterday afternoon wherein he eulogized the ex-Premier of Canada, Joseph Chamberlain, and the rest of his colleagues, the availability of offering the Governor-Generalship of Canada to Sir Charles Tupper, Bart, at the expiration of Lord Aberdeen's term of office.

Rumor also told that Hon. Mr. Chamberlain's views on this question are shared by the majority of the Imperial Cabinet, and that they all believe it would be a master stroke of statesmanship to accept the same time a splendid compliment to the loyalty of Canada as well as to its colonial statecraft.
