BACKED BY THE NEWSPAPERS

Attitude of the Spanish Government as to Cuba

SUPPORTED ON ALL SIDES.

Madrid Papers Declare the Position to Be Sober and Dignified.

Ministers Declare that the "Gorilla Wars" in the United States, without whose help the rebellion would long ago have been suppressed—Spanish Naval Forces in the Caribbean Sea to Be Sober and Dignified.

Madrid, Oct. 25.—The Madrid correspondent of The Daily Mail says: The Spanish press unanimously supports the attitude of the Government, which it calls eminently sober and dignified; but the impression is that the controversy with the United States has reached a critical stage which may be the prelude to a rupture.

Cuba Will Have Home Rule.—London, Oct. 25.—The Standard says: A member of the Cabinet assured me that the Government intends to give Cuba complete local government, with universal suffrage to elect municipal and provincial councils and an insular parliament. The latter will be composed of upper and lower chambers, having control of taxation and tariff.

Senators and Deputies for Cuba will continue to sit in the Spanish Cortes, and the Imperial Government will control the army, navy, police tribunals and foreign affairs of the colony, except the program of the authorities demanded. The Government has received promises of support of both the autonomists in Cuba and of those residing in France and the United States, and expects no opposition from the other colonial parties in the Chamber of Deputies.

General Castille Has Been Killed.—Havana, Oct. 25.—Private despatches received here confirm the report that General Castille, the well-known insurgent leader, has been killed in an engagement with the Spanish troops. It is further stated that his body was carried to La Chorrera, four miles distant from this city, where it was interred.

Famine Question in Ireland.—Archbishops and Bishops State Their Conviction that There Will Be Distress.—Dublin, Oct. 25.—(Correspondence to the Associated Press).—There are two sides to the question of the famine in Ireland. One side is that of the Government, which claims the famine is exploited by politicians as an argument against the administration.

THE ENGLISHMAN WHO WAS TORTURED IN THIBET SHOWED MUCH PLUCK.—London, Oct. 25.—The Daily Mail publishes a despatch from its special commissioner, Henry Savage Landor, who says that in his recent attempt to reach Lhasa, the capital of Tibet, and the residence of the Grand Lama, he was nearly shot within four days' journey of the city.

DR. ALBERT HAM

Is the New Organist and Choirmaster for St. James' Cathedral, Toronto.

London, Oct. 25.—(Telegram Cable).—The selection of organist for St. James' Cathedral, Toronto, to succeed the late Dr. Stocks Hammond has fallen upon Dr. Albert Ham of Taunton. Dr. Ham came first into prominence when sub-organist of St. John's Church, Bathwick, where he was sound and steady in his recognition of the organ, from there to Hinister Parish Church at Bath. His next was his most recent appointment, St. John's Church, Taunton, at the organ of which he presided for over five years.

LOST FAITH IN THE STATES.—Pierre Lorillard and Marshall Field Bring Bids Reports From England.—London, Oct. 25.—The American Line steamer St. Louis, which sailed for New York from Southampton to-day, had on board Mr. Pierre Lorillard, the well-known American householder. After spending two years in Europe, Mr. Lorillard takes home with him a gloomy view of the conditions prevailing in the United States. He said just before sailing: "European capitalists have so utterly lost confidence in the United States that not even McKinley's election reassures them."

Medical Student Killed a Policeman.—Glasgow, Oct. 25.—After arresting a disorderly medical student named Battersby, who had resisted him with a knife, a constable named Macdonald had received several blows on the head, dropped dead on arriving at the police station with his injuries.

Tranquil River Overlooked.—Rome, Oct. 25.—The River Tevere, in Central Italy, which enters the Adriatic east of Anagni, has overflowed, flooding the plain of Anagni. At Chiaravalle a bridge has been swept away, several persons have been drowned at Frosi, and near Mentola a house collapsed, burying nine persons in the ruins. Floods are reported in various other localities.

Disastrous Land-slip in Italy.—Rome, Oct. 25.—A telegram from Ancona, on the Adriatic, announces that severe floods there have caused several landslides, interrupting railroad communication and for a time cutting that port from telegraphic communication. The landslip was swept away by the floods and drowned. Since this message was sent the telegraph lines have again been broken.

Sunday Entertainment.—London, Oct. 25.—The Oxford Music Hall, this city, where Sunday evening sacred concerts have been introduced, adds a new turn to-morrow, when Mrs. Ormiston Chant, the well-known social reformer who came into prominence a year or so ago by her crusade against music halls, etc., lectures on the subject of "The Necessity for Sunday Evening Amusement."

Heavy Robbery in France.—London, Oct. 25.—A special despatch from Lyons says that a band of burglars in the house of an eccentric old gentleman named Bell Friday night, M. Bell kept his entire fortune, 200,000 francs in money and 100,000 francs in securities, in a safe in the house. Saturday morning the safe was found two miles away, having been broken open and rifled. M. Bell kept no record of the numbers of his securities.

St. Richard H. Collins Promoted.—London, Oct. 25.—The Hon. Sir Richard Henn Collins, Judge of the Queen's Bench Division of the High Court of Justice, this city, has been appointed Lord Justice of Appeal, in succession to the Right Hon. Sir Nathaniel Lindley, recently appointed Master of the Rolls.

A Constitutional Question.—At Onquago Hall an interesting point was raised in the suit of Duncan McDonald against the Lake Simcoe Ice Company for damages for trespass across his water lots and spoiling the same by cutting a canal through it. Now, those lots are owned by the Ontario government, and the Ontario government has no right to grant patents for water lots in harbors, according to the Dominion laws. The Attorney-General's power has been called in question.
