FAMINE QUESTION IN IRELAND.

Archbishops and Bishops State Their Con-viction That There Will be Distress. Dublin, Oct. 25 .- (Correspondence to Dublin, Oct. 25.—(Correspondence to the Associated Press.)—There are two sides to the question of the famine in Ireland. One side is that of the Government, which claims the famine is exploited by politicians as an argument against the administration of Ireland. The other side, held by many of the clergy, politicians and people, is that it is certain there will be great distress through large sections of the country.

A meeting of the Roman Catholic predates was held at Maynooth this week, and those present adopted resolutions that the Archbishops and Bishops of Jireland deem it their duty to present to the Government a statement of their conviction, formed on the personal knowledge of members of that body, that the failure of the potato and cereal crops in many districts, particularly on the southern and western coasts, must lead to great distress, and, unless speedy measures of relief are adopted, to disastrous consequences. Meetings are being held, the parish priests presiding, urging the Government to start relief works before the people are actually suffering.

The Government officials insist on keeping themselves fully informed regarding the conditions beyealing, and will be able to cope with the distress, but they say they are unable to announce at this time what districts or how many people will be affected. the Associated Press.)-There are two
