BOYS, THIS IS CIRCUS DAY!

Big Aggregation of 4-Paw-Sells is Now on the Old Baseball Grounds Over the Don.

ROUTE OF THE PARADE TO-DAY.

World Man Was on the Grounds Yesterday and It is a Great Big Show.

To-day is circus day. To-day business, as a matter of course, will have to be suspended. The Forepaugh-Sells Bros' consolidation have not blasted it forth that they have the "greatest show on earth," but they convinced a sceptical World man yesterday that they have. The fact that two mammoth shows were combined was a guarantee of a sensational production. The curious crowds who yesterday swarmed the old baseball grounds over the Don showed that the circus folk in town of the past week or so had worked interest to a boiling point. All who went down to get their foretaste could not be satisfied that the posters had not done the thing justice. And this is decidedly an abnormal state of affairs.

Remember It's the Ball Grounds.

There were but few disappointed ones. These were they who had journeyed up to King and Dufferin-street corner lot, where the circus was advertised to locate. They must have felt that the circus was a bit of an untold joke on the part of the management. It was only as late as midnight on Saturday that it was decided to drive in the stakes in the lot instead of the west. The site chosen is more convenient alike to the management and to the public. The Toronto and suburban population will be better car facilities in the east, the circus men more room.

An Idea as to Its Size.

With a show the size of the one which is leaving Toronto to-day, the circus site is a weighty consideration. It is no small matter to lay out a town, and it is scarcely a smaller one to survey a lot for the 4-Paw-Sells Bros' circus. It takes a veritable farm to suffice. Thirty tents, varying in size from an acre to a square rod, would not do room in a corner lot. Three trains, aggregating 90 cars and equipment, and carrying 700 persons and 60 horses, have swamped down upon the city. Circus, why is it a whole village. From the assessor's standpoint it would be a small city.

No Morbid Features.

In character it is to be purely a circus. There will be no spectacular features. They have not a success. The circus does not extort over them, and smaller shows have found them to be a losing speculation. The World saw the managers and gathered some inside tips about the side-shows. There is no attempt in evidence to cater to a morbid taste. There is nothing repulsive to the most delicate and refined sensibility. Freaks and deformities are replaced by natural history rarities and genuine phenomena.

None of the privileges are leased. Even the peanuts are sold by direct employees of the concern. So that the usually unobtainable feeding fair will not be a source of painful memories in his trip.

Actors, Musicians and Brute.

The talent comprises 200 performers, exclusive of "The Sealiskin Band" (of seals), and brute actors of varied sorts. The wild animals are imprisoned in some 80 cages. The clowns are said to be of the best. Everything catchable has been caught by the agents of this company. They have an elephant securely chained, who has killed his man four times. A RAILROAD COMBINE.

C. P. R. and Great Northern Will Build a Line Together.

Vancouver, B.C., June 25.—The Canadian Pacific Railway and Great Northern, which were both recently thinking of building lines from Midway to Republic, have, it is understood, arrived at an agreement whereby a joint line will be laid to connect the famous Boundary Creek mining camp of British Columbia with the equally famous Washington camp. The line will be about 35 miles long.

HUMBOLDT IS AT SEATTLE.

She Carried About \$600,000 Worth of Gold Dust From the Golden Klondike Country.

TWO ENGLISHMEN THE RICHEST.

Estimated Clean-Up Will Be About \$12,000,000 to \$16,000,000—3000 Men Begging.

Seattle, Wash., June 25.—Purser Carroll of the steamer Humboldt, which arrived Friday from Alaskan points, states that he had in his custody \$250,000 in dust, and estimates that there was about \$300,000 more in the different staterooms, not turned over to him. To-day \$150,000 worth of dust was deposited in the United States Assessor's Office and \$50,000 lot was billed at an express office, for shipment to Philadelphia.

Men With Big Wads.

H. Wolsten and "Dan" Saunders of England had the reputation of being the richest two men on board. They were credited with \$1,000,000 between them about \$500,000. The price of the sale of several claims. A Mr. Happer of Philadelphia was credited with \$40,000. Other large holders were D. P. Williams, August Peterson, Dr. J. H. Hill, Palmer Hill, Alexander M. Hart, G. S. Allen, "Mike" White, K. Hill, S. J. Miller, E. A. Peck, M. Lamen, D. H. Boehm and John Nelson.

The Estimated Clean-Up.

Some of the passengers left as late as June 8. They report that the clean-up is practically finished. The estimate of the clean-up will amount to from \$12,000,000 to \$16,000,000. Times are quiet in Dawson and there are many idle men there.

James S. Clarke of Victoria estimates that at least 10,000 men will come out this summer, but that their places will be filled by men going in.

Michael Wiley, an old California miner, reports that there are 5000 penniless men at Dawson begging for assistance to get up the river. Many others are working for their board.

Comes to Canada.

News from the north is that the new boundary line has deprived nearly 2000 American miners of a gold output conservatively estimated at \$20,000,000 a year, and given this wealth to citizens of Canada. The territory involved is the Porcupine mining district, on the Dalton Trail, above the Indian village of Kikawana, a vast tract of placer ground, which gives dazzling promise of a great mineral outcrop. The boundary decision, due to a daily decision reached by the Porcupine miners on the 15th and they were thrown into a state of frenzied excitement. The proposed new boundary is over 40 miles south of any point; heretofore claimed by the Canadian police outpost, according to the stories floating down from the north.

ARTHUR WIGLE DROWNED.

Popular Young Farmer of Gosfield Township Went Bathing and Lost His Life.

Kingsville, Ont., June 25.—Last evening Arthur Wigle, aged 24, and youngest son of Phillip Wigle, farmer, living on the third concession of Gosfield Township, was drowned while bathing in Cedar Creek. Deceased and his two companions, Robert Drake and Mr. Moore, were all good swimmers, but without a word, after diving, deceased being seized with cramps or heart failure. His companions rescued the body with a net, and with the aid of a physician heroic endeavors were made to resuscitate, but in vain. Deceased was very popular and widely known all over Essex County. He was 19 years married in one month to a prominent young lady of the township.

RYAN AND McDONNELL Have Contracted With McKenzie & Mann to Build the Inverness Railway.

Montreal, June 25.—(Special.)—Messrs. McKenzie & Mann have just given an important contract to Ryan & McDonnell, building the Inverness Railway. The contract embraces the entire 60 miles of the Inverness Railway, from Point Tupper on the Strait of Canso, northward and includes grading, track laying and ballasting. 30 miles to be completed this year and a heavy start on the remaining section. The 200 men now employed by the company are to be transferred to Ryan & McDonnell and increased to 1000 at once. Hugh Doherty is to be the contractors' representative on the work, and it is understood that McKenzie & Mann strongly desire to extend the railway 40 miles further to Cheticamp next year if subsidies are forthcoming.
