Share of Court and Running Expenses, Also Cost of Furniture in Court House Not Settled.

York County councillors concluded their first session of the year on Saturday in time to get away on the afternoon train.

Some of them, however, will return on Tuesday to press the county's private bill before the legislature.

On Saturday the County Property Committee reported against sending delegates to the Eastern Good Roads Association meeting at Ottawa.

They recommended that no action be taken at present in regard to receiving receipts for documents in the County Registry Office.

Mr. Macleod, registrar, also decided not to take any action until June upon the proposed reduction of the area of Markham Village.

The county treasurer complimented the Council upon the management of county affairs, and expressed his opinion that matters were more economically managed in the county than in the city.

The special committee presented upon the settlement of judicial expenses between the city and county an agreement, which provides that the city pay 78 per cent. and the county 22 per cent.
