The man with the peaked cap then remembered that he was not to leave the parcel there and stepped off the veranda to the house next door. Mr. Bone, thinking he had merely left a parcel, thought nothing of it until a short time afterwards when he heard an infant's cry. Then he went downstairs and discovered the baby, which was a healthy girl about two weeks old. The child was taken in for the night, and this morning was handed over to the police, who under direction of the Mayor placed it with the other two, one of whom appears to have come from the same veins. The Mayor does not relish these increases in the town's family, and has called a special meeting of the Executive Committee for Monday night at which authority will not be given him to send them to the House of Providence. This institution, upon being paid a fee, will take children of ages upon condition that the institution shall have absolute control of them. They have about 300 children now.
