Stewart Made Charges.

Some rather serious charges were made by Ald. Stewart when the committee was discussing the doing away altogether with an east-end garbage destructor. He said there should be a crematory somewhere on the marsh, and in support of his contention stated that city scavengers were dumping garbage in Ashbridge's Bay and that they carted mattresses thru the public streets from the Isolation Hospital. Men who moved them had contracted diphtheria and had taken it home to their families. Mattresses could be seen floating around in the bay, and some had been taken out of the water by the people, thus adding to the daninger of spreading disease.

Fleming Saw Mattresses. Stewart Made Charges.

Fleming Saw Mattresses, Ald. Fleming said he had seen mat-tresses floating around in the bay, and had known of an employe of the Street issioner's department contracting

Dr. Sheard was sent for, and he Malpeques, br. Sheard was sent to, strenuously denied that any mattresses were ever removed from the Isolation Hospital. The mattresses are filled with straw. The only thing collected by the scavenging department from the Isolation Hospital is the ordinary kitchen, garbage. No mattresses or any chen garbage. The mattresses he had seen were not made of straw. He wanted \$300 put in the estimates for destroying garbage in the east-end, but the city decided that all the necessary cremating could be done at the western destructor.

In explanation of an item of \$10,000 for water, Engineer Rust said we use 83,000,000 gallons of water a year for flushing sewers, and it costs us 10 cents a thousand, but he remarked that he manufacturers' rate was only 5c a

Won't Have Stone Quarry. After a long discussion the item of \$10,000 for a stone quarry was struck out.

Waterworks Estimates.

The waterworks estimates came in for some serious consideration, and Ald. Spence wondered why the Engineer had not included several Ligitems in the bylaw, which was submitted to the people at the late election.

The committee decided that the Parks and Exhibition Committee should take hold of Reservoir Park as it was unfair to have the whole expense of its maintenance charged to the waterworks. It was a public park and should be the same as other parks; \$.5541 was asked for the park, but it was reduced to \$2700.
