Remarkable Results From Wheat Cultivation.

A Pioneer on British Lows and Justice.

CULTIVATION OF WHEAT.

To the Editor of The Advertiser:

With the hope that some of your readers will try to rival the wheat-growers in the old country, I again ask you to give space to extracts from the annual report of Sir J. B. Lawes' experimental farm, on which wheat has been grown every year for 52 years. On one piece of manure, the crop this year is 16 3/4 bushels per acre, weighing 61 3/8 pounds of 48 pounds. Three plots, manured with artificial manures, gave an average of 39 3/4 bushels, of 62 7/8 pounds to the bushel. The average yield of all, including the unmanured piece, is 23 1/2 bushels, of 63 1/8 pounds, or 35 1/4 bushels of 62 pounds. All the figures are much above the averages of 10, 24 or 44 years, and there is no former record of 64 pounds to the bushel. A later report of the general crop gives equally good results, viz., 50 bushels to the acre in one county, 48 bushels in two counties, 36 to 40 bushels in fourteen counties, and 30 to 35 bushels in nearly all the rest.

Very few of the wheat-growers of good farming, have helped to make this record. Will not one of your readers, residing in that part of the world, on this side of the water? Yours, etc., G. MERCEUR.
