## FINED FOR REBATING

The New York Central Again Mulcted for Rebating.

New York, Nov. 22.-Judge Holt, of the United States circuit court, today fined the New York Central and Hudson River Railroad Company \$18,000 for rebating freight charges to the Ameri-

The fine was the result of an indictment charging the company with rebating in the sum of \$26,000 to the American Sugar Refining Company. There were two counts in this indictment, and a fine of \$108,000 already had been imposed on the first count. In passing the sentence, Judge Holt denied the contention of counsel that a corporation cannot be fined. He declared that under the provisions of the Elkins act a corporation is responsible

for the act of its agents. Sentence in the case of the American Sugar Refining Company, convicted of receiving rebates, was referred until

next Tuesday. It is understood that the grand jury will be summoned again to consider cases of alleged rebating by other railroads on heavy shipments of grain, implements and other bulky articles.

BIG DETROIT FIRE.

Detroit, Nov. 21.—Shortly before noon today a big fire broke out in the furniture warerooms of the Owen Company, Limited, Fort street east, and before extinguished the whole building was in ruins.

Joe Lucas, 754 Grandy, escaped by jumping from the third-story window. He was badly cut and hurt. The loss is estimated at \$75,000.
