Local Manager Beard, of the Bell Telephone Company, stated to The Advertiser today that the report of the royal commission regarding the hours and conditions of the employes of the Toronto exchanges has no direct application to London.

Conditions are so different here and in Toronto that they bear no relation to the other, outside of the fact that in both places there are telephone operators.

In Toronto, Mr. Beard said, the business is very great and the girls are compelled to work at high pressure all the time. In London, such is not the case. Here the girls never work more than seven hours a day, and the majority work shorter hours. There is no dissatisfaction here, management and employes being perfectly satisfied with the conditions.
